Where In Charlotte?




My name is Brian Labigan; I am President of the Charlotte Youth Athletic Association (**CYAA**). In 1990, my wife Michele and I were looking for a local baseball league for our 6 year old son. A neighbor suggested **CYAA**. I did a little research and found out that the league was originally established in 1953 by Charlotte resident AI Frattare to foster and promote athletics in the community. At that time the league primarily consisted of local neighborhood kids and played on fields in the Harding Rd area. Over time the league grew and set up its base of operation behind Charlotte High, and stayed at that location until 2005.

At that point with help from City, County and State resources as well as private fundraising, the **CYAA** was able to construct 7 new baseball fields on Monroe County park land in Ontario Beach Park on an unused plot of park land bordered by Wilder Terrace and Hincher Rd.

Through its network of dedicated parents, volunteers and sponsors, the CYAA has continued to offer opportunities for boys and girls ages 4-16 to develop their physical abilities as well as their sense of sportsmanship, teamwork, discipline and hard work. CYAA programs have been carefully developed to take into account the developmental stages of the players, offering 5 age divisions of baseball to meet the challenges of each age level. Each child gets a uniform shirt and hat to keep and receives a trophy at the end of the season and each league participates in an end of the season celebration.

The Charlotte Youth Athletic Association (**CYAA**) has provided quality recreational baseball for the boys and girls in northwest Rochester, NY for the past 62 years. (*Continued on page 6—CYAA*)



Highlights of the Charlotte Community General Meeting - March 2, 2015

- All Board members present—quorum established, Voting members received ID tags. Attendance: 44. Minutes of 1/5/15 approved by voting members.
- Secretary, Pam Postgate stepping down due to personal reasons. To remain as Director through December 2016. Sue Roethel appointed Secretary for remainder of term.
- Thank you gift and special recognition presented to past board members and newsletter editor. Present to receive this recognition were past board members Joe Hinchman and Dan Brothers, and former newsletter editor Marie Poinan. Other past board members will be recognized as they attend future meetings.

<u>RPD</u>: Lt. Jeffrey Koehn & Crime Prevention Officers (CPO) Jason Blanchard and Kelly O'Hara reported no significant crime patterns in the neighborhood over the past month. More information available at the Police and Citizens Interaction Committee (PCIC) meeting is on the third Tuesday of each month at 7pm at Aquinas Institute.

<u>RCSD</u>: Dr. Bolgen Vargas, Superintendent of Schools, presented his proposal to close Charlotte High School in 2016. The building will remain open and occupied completely by The Leadership Academy for Young Men, which currently shares the building with CHS. Students from CHS will attend other district schools. (See Page 8 for details.)

<u>City of Rochester presentation</u>: Mitch Rowe, Director of Planning & Zoning, provided an update on the proposed development plans of Edgewater Resources. He provided the CCA with a set of the plan

documents. (See Page 8 for details.) Community/Neighborhood Updates:


- Motion made on 1/5/15 General Meeting to recognize CHARLOTTE Strong as a community group was withdrawn. New motion: CCA immediately send a letter to the City requesting that all meetings with the community regarding the port development project be open and inclusive of all community members. The motion was seconded and approved by a vote of the members.
- ◆Matt Juda for POCMA: Sponsoring the Lakeside Farmer's Market on Mondays, June-September, with 10-12 vendor booths. Donations and volunteers are welcomed.
- Fred Amato for Ontario Beach Park Planning Committee. Two-day Lakeside Winter Celebration event in February was a success. Attendees for Saturday events stayed most of the day, whereas on Sunday people leave immediately after the Polar Plunge.
- Ron Penders, Director of the City's Northwest Quadrant Service Center: reported that there are roofing grants available to fix 150 roofs city-wide. Applications accepted until March 17th. Also, City is preparing to do "uplift" events in each community. Advised the CCA to pick a day between May and September and a vacant lot for the location of the "uplift" event. He will be bringing in a variety of services for residents such as Rec on the Move, RPD Canine, health related resources, Rochester Fire Dept reps, RPD Mounted Unit, etc.

Koehn has only been in this position for a few weeks, he has been with the RPD for 24 years. In his last position, Lt. Koehn commanded the Third Platoon

(evening shift) in the Patrol Division East. Having grown up in the south east area of Rochester, this officer proudly admits he is a Buffalo Bills fan!

His goal for the Charlotte area and the Northwest Neighborhood Service Center is to have a noticeable, positive effect on public safety and quality of life. "I want the residents to feel safe." The top priority is to be responsive to community's concerns. "I want them to feel like we're listening and doing our level-best to address those concerns. There are a lot of people in the Charlotte community I have yet to meet, and I want to get to know them and hear from them what the challenges are." When asked how these goals can be accomplished, he responded, "I believe the best way to accomplish anything is to work together. Relationships between people are so important. This means good partnerships with members of the community and officers who patrol the area. I intend to work closely with Lake Section Command to keep them informed of the Charlotte Community's concerns



What is Lt. Koehn looking for from Charlotte residents? "I appreciate the patience of the residents as I learn my new job, and specifically the police related concerns in the Charlotte area. I believe folks realize that our resources in the police department are not unlimited, and it's our job to determine how best to use those resources to accomplish our goals. Sometimes it takes time to realize results, and we appreciate patience in those circum-

stances as well."



f you like to listen to Big Band music, or want to dance, or just enjoy the social atmosphere, the Big Band Series sponsored by the Ontario Beach Park Program Committee (OBPPC) is for you! Wednesday nights in the spring and fall, there is some fancy footwork going on at the Roger Robach Community Center from 6-9 pm. (Check the CCA calendar!) Joe Carrozzi, Chairman of the Ontario Beach Park Program Committee, says that about 200 people attend each week. The music featured is Big Band – "That's my music!" says Joe. Ages tend to range from 30's to 90's; and once one turns 80, if one chooses, as well as working with other volunteers. The success of these activities encouraged these volunteers from the community to continue planning other events. "We saw the families, mothers pushing baby



The building will remain open and occupied completely by The Leadership Academy for Young Men, which currently shares the building with CHS. Students from CHS will attend other district schools.

The Leadership Academy's Principal **Wakili Moore** introduced four students who currently attend the school and also have joined the Army ROTC. One student described how the school has saved him from gang activity and is supporting his academic and personal success. Principal Moore explained that elementary students who are ready to move up to secondary school are given seven options across the district. They can visit the Leadership Academy and talk to current students about their experience.

Dr. Vargas explained that the district is expanding the school to provide students with new opportunities and engage them in activities that will support a healthier lifestyle. The school is trying to resurrect the marching band and introduce musical and theatrical performances. He asked that the neighborhood invite these students into the community. He challenged area businesses to consider hiring students from the Leadership Academy for summer jobs. He said he is willing to put district resources into this.

Many audience members said they are graduates of CHS and are sad to see it close. Dr. Vargas gave his assurace that the CHS archives will remain in the building.

Board member Brian Labigan suggested using Charlotte in the Leadership Academy's name to keep the community connection. Both Dr. Vargas and Principal Moore were receptive to this idea.

March 2nd Update from Mr. Mitch Rowe, City of Rochester Planning & Zoning Director (continued)

Edgewater's application for a building permit is currently under review. The proposed plans are for a 10-story building (8 stories on top of a 2-story podium) that includes 52 hotel rooms, 18 condos, retail spaces, outdoor dining area, and 58 parking spaces (51 of them underground). Mr. Rowe reported that Edgewater's plans are in compliance with regard to uses (mix of hotel, condos, commercial spaces, and outdoor dining) but are not in compliance in several other areas (podium and tower placements, design elements, commercial frontage, doorways and parking area). He said the plans contain nine deficits that constitute an unprecedented number of zoning code violations.

The project has been on hold for 6-8 weeks now. Building plans must first meet zoning code regulations, which address design only, and then they must meet building code regulations, which address construction and structural stability.

The zoning deficits must be addressed either by remediation or variances to existing codes in order for the permit application to proceed. Edgewater principal **Greg Weykamp** has received feedback from the City regarding the status of his application. He has one year to do one of the following: 1) change the plans and resubmit them; 2) apply for variances; or 3) withdraw the application. An application for variances would require a public hearing through the Zoning Board of Appeals.

The permit application was received by the City in September, 2014, so Mr. Weykamp has until September, 2015 to respond. He can request an extension of that deadline, but Mr. Rowe doubts that it will be needed.

If Edgewater submits new plans, they will go back to the Project Review Committee. The committee is a team of volunteers who review plans for compliance and make recommendations, but they do not approve them. Mr. Rowe explained that an article in the January CCA newsletter erroneously reported that the Project Review Committee gave "unanimous approval" of Edgewater's plans. In fact, the Project Review Committee makes recommendations to the City of Rochester's Planning & Zoning Department and has no authority to approve a Site Plan.

Mr. Rowe explained that the Marina District Zoning Code, approved in 2012, allows for building heights up to 13 stories. A public hearing was held in May, 2012, but it was not well attended. A CCA member who was involved in the process back then said it took the community two years to complete a set of zoning code guidelines that the City rejected and essentially adopted a new zoning code that the community did not approve. Any future amendments to the zoning code, if adopted, would not affect the current building permit application made by Edgewater.
