CCA Board Follows Up With Letter To City About the Port Of Rochester

On July 1st, the Charlotte Community Association Board (Board) issued a letter to the Mayor of Rochester and members of the City Council expressing neighborhood concerns about the Port of Rochester mixed-use development project. The letter was a follow-up response to the April 7, 2015, communication sent to the same group. The Board stated that it believes that most members of the Charlotte Community, both residents and non-residents, want some form of development at the Port of Rochester. It acknowledged that there are differing opinions across the community and remained concerned that there continues to be many unanswered questions, causing further frustration. The letter went on to describe a list of objections from those who challenge the current plan.

The Board identified that there is not community consensus relevant to the project, "nor do we have a viable means to quantify what a community consensus would be" and highlighted that the one overarching common-ground concern is the height of the buildings. The current proposal from Edgewater for Parcel 1 North East shows additional, not fewer, floors on the hotel/condo building. "Thus, we remain unsatisfied with the City's and Edgewater's response to our concerns."

In summary, the Board stated:

"Here is what we believe our community needs and deserves to have from the City of Rochester:

- Assurance that development at the port will continue in some form.
- Acknowledgement of citizens' ongoing concerns and addressing them openly, timely and respectfully, and to the satisfaction of the community.
- Assistance to establish consensus of what the community at large wants for the Port.
- As an act of good faith, request Edgewater to immediately provide 3D design drawings of the building showing details of aesthetic features, materials and elements.
- Time to secure feedback from the community once those 3D design drawings are made available
- Provide an overall aesthetic view of the entire project."

The Board closed out the letter with this request:

"Dear Mayor and Council Members, please take our position into consideration when moving forward with development plans for the Port of Rochester. It is our goal to advocate for all voices to be heard and to be a significant part of the process that will ensure the best possible outcome for our community as a whole."





Navy Seabee Veterans Complete Restoration Project At Charlotte Cemetery Photographs and story contributed by Marie Poinan



n Thursday June 25, 2015, approximately 40 people celebrated the completion of the Charlotte Cemetery restoration project with an unveiling of a nautical flagpole and dedication of a memorial stone.

Restoration work by the Navy Seabee Veterans of America Island X-12 Seabees started in 2012 when the Seabees began a dedicated effort to reset, repair and replace missing and damaged headstones. It didn't take them too long to realize what a daunting task it would be! They received permission from the City of Rochester, advice from the Friends

of Mount Hope and donations from Home Depot, the 108th NY Infantry Regiment and the Charlotte Community Association. The CCA held a fundraising cruise in 2013 onboard the HarborTown Belle which funded the memorial stone. For the past 90 years, members of Lake Methodist Church have tended the Holden plot in the cemetery.

Speakers for the event were **Chuck Stechna** for **Carla Palumbo**, **Ron Penders** from the City of Rochester Northwest Neighborhood Service Center, County Legislator **Tony Micciche**, **Brian Labigan** from the CCA and **Fred Amato** from the Charlotte-Genesee Lighthouse Historical Society.



Update from Joseph Morelle, NYS Assembly

In June, the state legislature concluded the 2015 session after reaching agreements on a wide range of issues that are critical to citizens in our community and across the state. Though it was certainly a challenging session, I am proud of the work we accomplished.

I am especially pleased that the Assembly and the Senate have both passed my bill (A3057A) mandating that the sale of battery operated smoke detectors have batteries that are non-replaceable, non-removable and will power the device for a minimum of ten years.

I have dedicated this legislation to the memory of **Tyler Doohan**, a nine year old boy who died in a house fire here in Rochester last year after trying to help save members of his family. A working smoke detector could have sa ved Tyler's life and the lives of others lost in that tragic fire. In fact, the majority of fire-related deaths transpire in homes without working smoke alarms or no alarms at all. Working smoke alarms should be universal in every household. They are without question the most important item a family can have to protect themselves from a fire. This legislation will ensure that alarms are longlasting and maintenance-free, making significant strides in preventing fire-related deaths and injuries.

I am hopeful that the Governor will sign this bill into law and continue to position New York as a national leader in fire safety and consumer protection.



Marina Construction Schedule Update for July, 2015 By Tom Marchetti, Resident Project Representative, Labella Associates, D.P.C.

During the next month of the marina project, the following will be taking place:

- ◆ Continue the installation of the concrete revetment curb at the top of the basin.
- ◆ Continue the stone placement at the marina slopes.
- Dredging of the river at the marina entrance.
- Begin the installation of the lighting conduit.
- ◆ Install the piles in the marina basin.
- Possibly restart the excavation.

It is the contractor's intention to have the marina basin completed including the docks this season. He also will complete as much of the site work (Concrete sidewalks / Paving) as the weather will allow in the fall.


