11 am to 4 pm: Autumn at the Lake., Ontario Beach Park, Lake Avenue at Beach

Avenue. Bring the whole family to a day of fun featuring hayrides, pumpkin decorating, Rec on the Move recreation vehicles, historic exhibits, free rides on the Dentzel Carousel and children's activities. 11 am to 4 pm: One Cubic Foot at Ontario Beach

Stop by the Seneca Park Zoo Society's One Cubic Foot booth (you'll recognize it by the giant green cube!). Learn about the recent initiative to assess the health of the Genesee River by examining how many creatures exist in one cubic foot along the shore of the Genesee River. Free.

1 to 2 pm: Charlotte Cemetery Tour

Explore Charlotte Cemetery, burial place for many early settlers of the city's northwest side, including famed daredevil Sam Patch. View the restoration work done by the Navy Seabee Veterans. Sponsored by the Charlotte Community Association. Meet on Lake Avenue at River Street. Additional parking is available at the Ira Jacobson Post Home on St. John's Park. Free event.

1 to 3 pm: Guided Bike Ride from Seneca Park to the Port of Rochester

This scenic tour with spectacular views of the river gorge, will take riders along the Genesee Riverway Trail, through Turning Point Park on a 4,000 foot boardwalk, and under the O'Rorke Bridge. This is a 12-mile ride on a paved trail with a few moderate hills. Meet at Seneca Park Zoo parking lot. Helmet required. Free.

1 to 5 pm: Charlotte Genesee Lighthouse Tours

Tour the oldest active surviving lighthouse on Lake Ontario (1822); climb the Octagonal Tower for great views of Lake Ontario, explore the Keeper's House, see the new 4th Order Fresnel Lens and take a walk through the War of 1812 International Peace Garden. The gift shop will also be open. \$3 admission.

2 to 2:30 pm: WPA Murals of Charlotte High School

Join Charlotte High School archivist Marie Poinan in the Auditorium for a talk on the installation of eight murals by artist Carl Peters in 1942 and hear the story of their 2009 restoration. Sponsored by the Charlotte High Archivists and Class of 1945. Free.

3 to 3:30 pm: Tour of Charlotte High School campus

Meet at the front door to take a guided tour of the remodeled building which is now home to the RCSD's Leadership Academy for Young Men. Visit the Charlotte High archives in the 5th floor rotunda. Charlotte was one of twelve schools remodeled in the School Modernization Program, receiving recognition from the Rochester chapter of the AIA in the Interior Design category. Not recommended for children under 10. Free.



Her focus in the Charlotte neighborhood includes Port of Rochester development and quality of life issues in Charlotte such as the impact of zombie houses and absentee landlords.

Donna Bour-Purdy



Clematis Street Water Problems

For several years residents of Clematis St. have been concerned about the volume of water runoff from the Lake Shore Golf course during heavy rain storms. This and other issues have deteriorated the road surface of the street. Neighbors have been unsuccessful in resolving the problem when they contacted the owner of the golf course. In 2014 we contacted City of Rochester engineer **Willie Larson** to advise us on how to remedy the situation. Mr. Larson visited the street and reviewed the problem with two residents, **Barb Soto and Jean Gottschalk**. After an inspection by the Pure Waters agency he determined the road would not be repaired until the water problems were addressed.

During the summer of 2015 we were fortunate to engage **John McMahon** of the NET office to assist us in communicating our concerns with city agencies and the Town of Greece. We have photos taken following a strong storm in August, 2014 that highlight the problem and John shared these with several engineers in the Town of Greece. On September 3, three representatives from Greece and three from the City of Rochester came to Clematis St. to meet with me and noted the drainage patterns on the golf course. They all agreed this needs to be corrected by the course owner to remedy the storm water runoff problems. **John Gauthier** of the Town of Greece will contact the owner and let us know his response to our request.

Having representatives from the City of Rochester and Town of Greece advocate for the neighbors of Clematis St. has brought us closer to our goal of correcting the water problems and repairing the street surface. We will follow through this time and work together to ensure that our concerns are addressed.

Update from NYS Assembly Majority Leader Joe Morelle

During the month of August, Majority Leader Morelle:

- ♦ Urged port authority to protect upstate airports and not lift the perimeter rule which would force Upstate travelers to contend with fewer available flight options at a significantly higher cost.
- ♦ Helped break ground on the University of Rochester's new Imaging Center and William and Mildred Levine Autism Clinic that will be vital in diagnosing and treating the growing number of children affected by autism spectrum disorder.
- ♦ Joined Assembly members Lupardo, Hevesi, and Crespo and convened a roundtable discussion with local leaders to examine the impact of poverty on children and their families.
- ♦ Welcomed **Speaker Heastie** to Rochester and toured Eastman Business Park, one of our region's top economic development sites, as well as Golisano Children's Hospital, the University of Rochester's newest addition to its innovative medical campus. Also met with local business, labor, and government leaders to discuss the priorities of the Finger Lakes region.

September was recognized as Hunger Action Month in New York State. Hunger is a widespread epidemic that plagues too many of our cities. Rochester currently experiences some of the worst poverty in the United States, with many impoverished neighborhoods lacking access to fresh fruits and vegetables and having few healthy, affordable food options. This leads to serious health issues such as obesity, diabetes, and heart disease. The goal of Hunger Action Month is to bring awareness and attention to this issue and encourage the involvement of our community to help solve this pressing issue. Foodlink and its network of hunger relief organizations have proven vital to the effort to curb hunger, providing over 18 million pounds of food to vulnerable children, seniors, and adults in its 10 county service area throughout the Finger Lakes region of New York. Monroe County Update from Legislators Tony Micciche and Brian Marianetti

t the October meeting of the County Legislature, there will be a vote on an agreement that will build the largest solar panel installations in Upstate New York. This is just the latest in a long string of green energy projects the County has pursued, the new solar panel installations will be built and paid for entirely by Solar Liberty.

This agreement is important for two reasons: the first is that it saves Monroe County \$366,000 every year by buying solar energy and re-selling it to the local power grid. Our top priority is to manage tax dollars in a responsible manner, and over the course of the 20 year agreement, taxpayers will save over \$7.3 million. The second reason is that in addition to protecting taxpayers, this agreement helps Monroe County to be good stewards of our local environment. Solar energy is one of the safest and cleanest forms of energy.

The arrays will be installed in two locations. One, adjacent to the closed Gloria Drive Landfill in Penfield, will produce 4 mega-watts of power and the other, adjacent to the Northwest Quadrant Treatment Plant in Greece, will produce 7 mega-watts of power. Both sites were selected to yield the best solar power results, but minimize visual impact to the community.

Charlotte Youth Athletic Association - CYAA - 2015 Season in Review

B aseball fans, the CYAA is excited to announce that a successful, fun-filled, 2015 season (62nd) serving players and their families is now a part of Charlotte history. Four

registration dates were held in March at the Holy Cross School cafeteria, followed by a parent meeting in April at the Holy Cross School gym to welcome the 225 boys and girls (ages 4-16)and their families. We reviewed general information, rules, and age-group-specific league information. During the third week in April, the players started reporting to our baseball fields at Ontario Beach Park. A two-week player evaluation period for each age group was conducted to determine players' skills for the purpose of dividing them into evenly-matched teams. Once teams were

selected, uniforms consisting of a hat, jersey and baseball socks (parents supplied baseball pants) were given to each player. Each age group played regularly scheduled games, Monday through Saturday (twice a week), from early May to the beginning of July.

Additionally, the players were able to participate in a Skills Challenge Day on the first Saturday in June where each age group tested their hitting, throwing and running skills. Each contributor received a participation medal along with 1st 2nd and 3rd place medals for the top three contestants by age group in each skill. Hot dogs, chips and drinks for players and families were provided compliments of our friends at the Ontario Beach Park Program Committee (OBPPC). The CYAA also
