# **New Snow Programs in the City**

Mayor Lovely A. Warren announced that the City has launched two new programs to help city residents through the winter.

"Adopt-A-Hydrant" is a new tool to

empower citizens to play an active role in snow removal and clearing operations in their neighborhood or near their business. Adopt-A-Hydrant, which is based on a similar program underway in the Corn Hill Neighborhood, uses an interactive online map that gives

visitors an opportunity to "adopt" a fire hydrant near their home or business and take responsibility to keep it clear of snow and ice. The interactive map displays all of

> the City's fire hydrants and provides users an option to select one for adoption.

Another important tool is a web-based interface with the GPSenabled Automatic Vehicle Locators in City plow trucks called "*Plow Trax*." The interface will provide managers with better information to make real-time adjustments during a plow run. It will also provide customer-service agents in the 311 Call Center with better information to provide citizens who call to find out when their street will be plowed. Plow Trax will also be available to the public on the City website, so citizens can keep up with the progress of plow runs, as well.



# Update on the Port of Rochester Development Process

he City of Rochester provided an update on the Port of Rochester development process at the November 7<sup>th</sup> CCA General Meeting. On hand to present the topic were Baye' Muhammad, Commissioner of Neighborhood and Business Development and Rick Rynski, Sr. Economic Development Specialist. Commissioner Muhammad advised that the City has been working with the Community Design Center Rochester (CDCR) to devise a planning process that will closely involve community stakeholders to solicit their feedback and assist the City in crafting a new Request for Proposals (RFP).

CDCR has been working with the CCA for more than a year to secure funding for a *community charrette*, or planning day, that will bring multiple

stakeholders together to envision what is collectively desired for the Port. The charrette is just phase one of the planning process. Phase two involves capturing the collected ideas and designing a formal, comprehensive vision plan that can be communicated in for the form of maps, text, drawings, list of priorities, etc.

The Commissioner announced on November 7<sup>th</sup> that, once the community completes phase one (the *charrette*) with the assistance of CDCR, the City will then contract with CDCR and provide funding for phase two (the vision plan). The entire process is expected to take about 12 months to complete.

Some citizens at the meeting still expressed concerns that this new process would be more of the same of

what the neighborhood has experienced in the past. Regarding what was planned before (by Edgewater Resources, LLC), the Commissioner stated, "Let's erase it."

The CCA Board feels this is the best possible scenario for the future development at the Port of Rochester because: 1) it underscores the City's commitment to allow stakeholders to help shape the new RFP and provide funding to do so; 2) utilizes a neutral entity like CDCR to facilitate the process; and 3) allows time for the process to be completed before proceeding with an RFP. In the meantime, the Board will continue its pursuit of fundraising for a *charrette* for the Port of Rochester and make plans for a *Charrette Day* in 2017.


