Charrette Update – July-August, 2017

Plans for the charrette for the Port of Rochester are finally getting underway, after a delay with the contract between the Community Design Center of Rochester (CDCR) and the City of Rochester, which is providing the initial funding.

CDCR has been engaged to assist the community with the charrette. They will work with a steering committee formed of members from the community who will lead the process over the next six months. The steering committee's charge is to plan a day to bring the community together for a brainstorming session (charrette) to envision new development at the Port. The charrette day will be scheduled on a Saturday this fall and will be open to the entire community. An exact date has not yet been chosen but will be announced as soon as possible.

CCA Seeking Nominees for 2018-2019 Board of Directors

The CCA Nominating Committee is soliciting nominations for the 2018-2019 Board of Directors. The following positions are up for election this year:

Vice President, Treasurer, and three Directors. Elected candidates will serve a two-year term from 1/1/18 to 12/31/19.

According to the Bylaws, all board members must be CCA members in good standing for at least two months prior to election and, with one exception, must reside within the boundaries of Charlotte. Current Bylaws allow for one seated Board member to reside outside of the Charlotte community.

Nominations must be received in writing by September 11, 2017.

Voting Rules: New or renewed members, effective as of **September 11, 2017**, are eligible to vote for Officers and Directors. More information about the elections and proxy voting will be coming soon.

Update: New York State Senate Joe Robach Enhancing Workforce Development to Improve Opportunities for More New Yorkers

Update: New York State Assembly Joe Morelle Summer, 2017

A swater levels continue to rise and devastating flood waters ravage our communities across the state, it is critical that government and community partners find ways to provide resources and relief for as many affected homeowners, businesses and not-for-profits as possible.

I am grateful to the governor for signing into law legislation (A7712/S5902) that Senator Helming and I sponsored which allows municipalities to immediately apply for funding under the Clean Water Infrastructure Act passed in this year's budget; bypassing the original 120-day wait period. This is a crucial step to ensure local governments have the necessary resources to safeguard public and environmental health.

However, as conditions continue to worsen, it is clear that more help is necessary. Therefore, I continue to work with my colleagues in the Assembly to find ways to help those affected get back on their feet. I have recently proposed bipartisan legislation (A8013) to create a Flood Recovery Program to provide much-needed support for those along the Lake Ontario-St. Lawrence seaway, including:

- \$40 million for affected property and business owners
- \$40 million for local governments
- \$25 million for mitigation and planning efforts to prevent further damage caused by the extensive flooding. This legislation addresses the immediate needs of our

This legislation addresses the immediate needs of our communities by offering uncapped aid to home and business owners for storm-related repairs and restoration, previously not covered by any other federal, state or local recovery program. It also takes proactive steps towards the future by allocating funds to ensure adequate infrastructure is in place to protect municipalities from further damage that may occur due to the already heightened water levels.

The safety of our residents is paramount. I remain committed to working with my colleagues in the Senate to turn this proposal into law and provide the support our neighbors on the lake deserve in their time of need.

Update: Molly Clifford Northwest City Council Member **City of Rochester**

y the time you read this, the City's budget process will have come to a close and the 2017-18 budget will likely have passed without much fanfare. Given all that is going on in the world, it is understandable that 1000+ pages' worth of budget documents are not the first thing people want to wade through to figure out what's going on in the City, so I am providing this overview.

This is a "hold the line" budget. Essential programs and services are maintained, taxes and fees are basically flat, and the structural operating deficit is largely covered by cuts and deferrals in capital projects. The Democrat and Chronicle has referred to it as an "election year budget" and, while that may be true, it is an

approach that is probably okay for a year or two. However, this could lead to some real degeneration in the City's historically strong financial position if we continue to do it over the long run.

On the revenue side, we continue to fall behind other upstate cities in the amount of unrestricted aid we get from New York State. We have tried to make the case for fairness over the past decade with only half-hearted support for any real change. We did not receive the \$6 million bump that we had last year. Similarly, our joint efforts with Monroe County, particularly the Library System and the Emergency Communications Department (9-1-1), continue to be underfunded by the County, leaving the City to plug holes to maintain vital services. The County has not increased funding to libraries since 2002.

As for expenses, over \$20 million in capital projects have been deferred or are proposed to be funded through bonding or the use of other funding. This could cost the City more over the long term as we have to pay interest on the debt. That being said, we are not seeing major program cuts or layoffs. Residents should see the same level of service this year and the hope is that our financial outlook improves so that next year we will be in a stronger position. I am hopeful to have a more optimistic report next year!
