

The Attorney General's office has approved an amended copy of the COI for an up or down vote by the Association. ## Nominations for 2018-2019 Board of Directors and Fall Elections

**N** ominations for the 2018-2019 Board of Directors will be accepted until the CCA meeting on September 11<sup>th</sup>. The following positions are up for election this fall:

Vice President, Treasurer, and three Directors. Elected candidates will serve a 2-year term from 1/1/18 to 12/31/19.

According to the Bylaws, all board members must be CCA members in good standing for at least two months prior to election and, with one exception, must reside within the boundaries of Charlotte. Current Bylaws allow for one seated Board member to reside outside of the Charlotte community.

Nominations must be received in writing by September 11, 2017.

## CYAA 2017 Season Review By Brian Labigan





Update: New York State Senate Joe Robach Combating Heroin & Opioid Addiction

## Update: New York State Assembly Joe Morelle

Flood Recovery Grants Established

A swe wrapped up the 2017 Legislative Session, I was proud to work with my colleagues in the Assembly, Senate, and the governor to establish a \$55 million grant program for flood recovery along Lake Ontario-St. Lawrence River seaway.

The grants will cover sustained direct physical damage caused by flooding that occurred between January 1, 2017 and June 30, 2017 and will be allocated as follows:

- •\$15 million for owners of residences. Grant shall be in an amount of no more than \$50,000. The owner of a non-primary residence shall only be eligible with respect to such non-primary residence if such owner had a qualified gross income no greater than \$275,000 for the 2016 taxable year. Funds will be administered by NYS Affordable Housing Corp. with preference given to greatest need.
- •\$15 million for small businesses, farms, homeowners associations, not -for-profit corporations, and owners of multiple dwellings. Grants shall be no more than \$50,000 for small businesses, farms, homeowners associations and not-for-profit corporations and \$20,000 for owners of multiple dwellings. Funds will be administered by NYS Urban Dev. Corp. with preference given to greatest need
- •\$15 million for counties, cities, towns, villages and special districts. Grant shall be in an amount of no more than \$1,000,000. Funds will be administered by NYS Housing Trust Fund Corp.

The bill also provides relief for municipalities still recovering previous natural disasters, allocating \$10 million for additional storm recovery which includes \$2 million for Monroe County windstorm recovery.

Our state and our community have always come together in times of need to help one another. When faced with disaster, New Yorkers come together like no other to lend a hand. This comprehensive legislative package continues that long tradition by providing necessary relief for homeowners, business owners, and local governments to help residents get back on their feet.

## **Update: Molly Clifford** Northwest City Council Member **Getting It Right on Parcel 5**

here has been a lot of attention lately on the Warren Administration's plans for Parcel 5, the major remaining portion of the former Midtown Plaza site. The City issued a Request for Proposal to interested developers last year, and ended in April with the Mayor's decision to choose the Rochester Broadway Theatre League's proposal for a Performing Arts Center, but with the addition of housing component in conjunction with Morgan Development.

Setting aside concerns about the process itself, the fact that there have been very few additional details released to the City Council or the public since April is

troubling. Despite the fact that Mayor Warren, RBTL and the development team have attempted to garner support for the project from the business community and New York State, there has been no opportunity for public comment until my colleagues and I hosted a public forum on August 10<sup>th</sup>.

The arts community has raised a number of questions about the RBTL plan, as have many other residents and stakeholders, including Assembly Majority Leader Joe Morelle. The questions run the gamut, from the size and layout of the facility and its revenue projections, to the impact it will have on other arts organizations and its use by City residents, more than a third of which live in poverty and unable to afford RBTL tickets. These are valid questions. I was disappointed by the defensiveness with which the questioning was met. People have a right to ask questions about a \$130+ million project in the heart of downtown.

We await the final proposal and associated legislation for Parcel 5, which I hope will come before the end of the year. Regardless of what it contains, I promise that the due diligence this project requires will be done. As always, please share your thoughts -

## Primary Election Day, September 12<sup>th</sup> Get out and vote! What is a Primary Election?

ccording to the Monroe County Board of Elections, "'Primary Election' is one in which only enrolled members of a party may vote for the purpose of nominating party candidates and electing party officers. In any election district, if a race is uncontested, no primary is held. A "Primary Election" is held on the first Tuesday after the second Monday in September before every general election unless otherwise changed by an act of the legislature. Polls are

This years' Primary Election is especially important. Primary Election Candidates are running for the Offices of City of Rochester Mayor, City Council and City School Board. Historically, winners of the primary election results in the City of Rochester have a significant edge over other candidates in the November election.

So your vote is important! If you are registered in a party, Get out and Vote! on September 12<sup>th</sup>! Polling stations will be open between 12:00 pm to 9:00PM.
