Update: New York State Senate **Joe Robach**

Delivering Health Benefits to Volunteer Firefighters



Update: New York State Assembly Joe Morelle

The brave men and women who put their lives on the line every day and volunteer to keep our communities safe should not be burdened with unexpected medical bills from illnesses they received while on the front lines of fire emergencies.

I am pleased to report that the Governor recently signed legislation into law that delivers health care benefits to volunteer firefighters who have been diagnosed with certain cancers.

I strongly supported this legislation in the State Senate and I am proud that these courageous New Yorkers will now receive the health benefits they deserve and the opportunity to lead a quality life in the community they have worked so hard to help protect.

Currently, volunteer firefighters are eligible for accidental disability and death benefits through Workers' Compensation if they are injured in the line of duty. Effective January 1, 2019, firefighters will also be eligible for health benefits to support treatment for life-threatening cancers.

Under the new law, volunteer firefighters who contract certain cancers will receive access to tax-free disability and death benefits. Specifically, volunteer firefighters diagnosed with lung, prostate, breast, lymphatic, hematological, digestive, urinary, neurological, reproductive systems, or melanoma cancer will be automatically eligible for health benefits if:

- ♦ · Upon entry to volunteer, a physical exam did not show any evidence of the cancers covered by this bill;
- ♦ · Individuals have at least five years of service fighting fire in the interior of buildings; and
- ♦ · The firefighter is currently active or within 5 years of his or her last active date.

It is fitting that volunteers who sacrifice their time, safety and health to protect their communities now have essential assistance available in their times of need. With this measure, we will provide these courageous New Yorkers the protections they need and the peace of mind they deserve.



Update: Molly Clifford Northwest City Council Member

The City of Rochester (City) is embarking on a new Citywide Housing Market Study; contracting with the firm Czb LLC from Alexandria, VA to perform the analysis. The study, updating the last one conducted in 2007, will help the City "better understand the current and potential breadth, depth and diversity of housing types, markets and market segments, financing tools, and emerging trends, as well as to identify the best data, methods, indicators, and collaborative strategies that can help the City, its residents and partners to achieve more balanced, sustainable growth."

Although, like many of you, I am a little study-weary; I do think this is a valuable effort for cities like Rochester to undertake every ten years or so. Several things have changed in Rochester over the past decade: the University of Rochester's student housing expansion into the 19th Ward; major investments in high-end downtown



housing; and the Focused Investment Strategy program, which tried to impact challenged neighborhoods through increased housing and infrastructure investment. It's a good idea for us to look at what has worked and what has not and how the City might better use its State and Federal Government dollars to stabilize and improve neighborhood housing markets.

Especially important to me is for us to learn more about how to increase home ownership versus renting and how we can better prepare first-time home owners for success. However, given that Rochester's rental properties make up more than 60% of our housing inventory, I also want to figure out how we ensure our housing providers are offering safe, affordable and high-quality units that improve our neighborhoods, not degrade them.

The chosen firm, Czb LLC, has roots in Western New York and has done housing studies in Buffalo and Geneva, as well as other "soft markets" across the country. They intend to have the bulk of their work completed in six months, including focus groups and stakeholder interviews; I am looking forward to seeing the results. SUCCESS for the Port of Rochester and Charlotte Community Charrette Day on November 4th Submitted by Sue Roethel)

n Saturday, November 4th, about 80 participants 6) Lake Avenue Corridor. from Charlotte and the Greater Rochester area gathered with 30 volunteers from the Community Design Center Rochester (CDCR) and CCA board members to commence the Port of Rochester and Charlotte Community Charrette Day at the Port Terminal Building. The all-day event opened with encouraging remarks from Mayor Lovely Warren, NYS Assembly Majority Leader Joe Morelle and NYS Senator Joe Robach (delivered by a representative in his absence).

Participants were randomly divided into small focus groups to study an assigned focus area among six different topics:

- 1)Transportation
- 2) Year-Round Activities in Underutilized Spaces
- Port/Marina area
- Ontario Beach Park
- 5) N. River Street

After a brief presentation on the history of Charlotte and its present day conditions, the groups then went outdoors, guided by CDCR facilitators, and conducted a walking tour of their respective study areas and began to visualize concepts that might improve them. The CDCR facilitators themselves are designers and architects promoting healthy, sustainable communities through quality design in the built environment. All of the great ideas put forth during this giant brainstorming session were captured on paper and shared with the full group later in the day. This process revealed many common ideas that can be identified as "what the community wants" for development in the neighborhood. Everyone came away with a better understanding of the area's needs and excitement about the possibilities and opportunities for the future.


