

The CCA Board is pleased to announce that it unanimously approved Matt Juda as Director to fill an open position that will run through December 2018.


If you want something done, give it to a busy person! If that saying is true, then the CCA Board has the right man for the job in Matt Juda.




Foodlink: "Just Say Yes" to Fruits and Vegetables Program

Update: New York State Senate Joe Robach Tax Relief for Middle Class Families

t is no secret that New York's taxpayers need and deserve real tax relief.

As the debate over tax reform continues in Washington D.C., I wanted to let you know about New York State's landmark middle-class tax cut that took effect on January 1st.



s I'm sure you are aware, the City Council has been considering making changes to the City's civilian review process for complaints against the Rochester Police Department. Several incidents over the past few years, both locally and nationally, have brought increased attention to how we deal with cases of excessive use of force, in particular.

A local group called "Enough is Enough" has done some research and outreach around the issue and has even drafted potential legislation for Council to consider. Council also asked the Center for Governmental Research to survey communities around New York State and report back to us on how their civilian review efforts are organized and whether or not they are successful.

In addition, Council subpoenaed records related to the Rickey Bryant case, in which a young man was

apprehended, guestioned and released after reports of shots fired after the Puerto Rican Festival. Bryant subsequently sued the City for excessive use of force during the apprehension. Council wanted to use the case to familiarize ourselves with the processes used by the RPD, its internal investigators, the Civilian Review Board (CRB), and the Police Chief to make decisions about whether the force used, as well as the policies and procedures followed, were appropriate. It was definitely a helpful exercise.

For me, there are a couple of issues that are particularly important. One, the public must trust the process. While the investigation of these cases is necessarily comprehensive and time consuming, those involved need to do a better job of communicating the seriousness of the cases. Second, as the Police Chief is the final arbiter on issues of discipline related to these matters, s/he must report the reasons for the findings, particularly if they are different than those of the CRB. Lastly, if we are to increase citizen influence in the process, we must be very careful to define their roles, how they are chosen and how they are trained. It is in everyone's best interest that this process is as open and objective as possible. There will be more discussion over the next few months – please feel free to share your thoughts with me and other Council members!






