t's that time of year again as college bound seniors start their search for financial aid.

Applications are now being accepted and the deadline is **June 30**th!

For many years the **Charlotte Community Association** has offered scholarships to students who qualify based on academics, community service and extra-curricular activities. Once again, two scholarships will be awarded to college bound students who are residents of the Charlotte community or attend the Leadership Academy for Young Men.

The Association will award one \$2,000 award which is made possible through community fundraising and membership donations.

Another award of \$2,000 is provided by a fund created in memory of

Edward Watson, a Charlotte resident and former Charlotte High student.

The requirements for both scholarships are the same and will be coordinated by the CCA Scholarship Committee. The college bound senior must either reside in the Charlotte neighborhood and attend any school, public or private, OR attend the Leadership Academy for Young Men (formerly Charlotte High School).

Applications will be available for both scholarships at the Charlotte Branch Library and online at the CCA website (charlottecca.org). 

ell, baseball fans, the Charlotte Youth Athletic Association kicked off its 65th season with a full roster! I'm happy to report that 180 boys and girls (ages 4 -16) and their families are lined up for a fun-filled baseball season. Starting with registration in March and team development in April, the teams will begin their regularly scheduled games in early May. They'll play twice a week, Monday-Saturday between 6-8pm (twice a week) until the beginning of July. Be sure to take in a game or two at the fields at the end of Hincher Street!

In addition to playing games, the players will be able to participate in a Skills Challenge day, on the first Saturday in June. Each age group tests their hitting, throwing and running skills. The top 3 finishers in each skill get a 1st 2nd or 3rd place medal. Everyone is treated to lunch provided by the **CYAA** and our friends at the

Ontario Beach Park Program Committee (OBPPC). The **CYAA** also partners with the **Rochester Red** Wings for players and families to watch a Saturday night game in June, when they walk on the field prior to the game and see fireworks after the game. The season wraps up at the end of June with a Trophy and Pizza night., with pizza donated by **Wegmans**.

A big thank you goes out to the **City of Rochester**, **Senator Robach**, **Monroe County** and many others that provided funding and support for the completion of a concession/bathroom/storage building to help centrally locate equipment and provide a means for fundraising as well as a replacement for the Porta-Johns we used for many years. Update: Molly Clifford Northwest City Council Member

The Nuisance Abatement Program (the "points" system) was created in 1985 to give the City better tools for dealing with properties that were long-term, significant neighborhood nuisances. It has been used with varying levels of success since then; however, last year the City lost a case in State Supreme Court that forced us to make some changes to the legislation in order to make it more effective.

The Court held that the City could not hold property owners responsible for illegal activities taking place at their properties without greater opportunity for them to defend themselves. Given that there have been other complaints about the program since its inception, the City took the opportunity to make additional changes.

Legislation to amend the law came before Council in April and does the following: allows property





While many of these changes are necessary to ensure the law can stand-up in court and the program is an effective neighborhood tool, it is not a perfect system. Neighbors have a right to enjoy their properties free of major nuisances and the City must continue to do everything it can to deal with problem properties in as quick and fair a manner as possible. 
Going forward we would like to have musicals and plays on our stage, karaoke nights without alcohol, and a sock hop night for us retirees.




