Monroe County Legislative Update

From Legislators Tony Micciche and Brian Marianetti

Last year, Monroe County began the process of building a new downtown campus of Monroe Community College (MCC) which has outgrown its current facility. The new site, located on State Street, will be renovated to accommodate a new, approximately 250,000 square feet downtown campus, with room for classes, parking and other amenities vital to MCC Operations.

At the February meeting of the County Legislature, we were proud to vote for a Project Labor Agreement (PLA) for the MCC Downtown Campus Project. This agreement between local trade unions, Monroe County and the developer provides uniform work conditions, cost savings, labor-management harmony, and protection against work disruptions arising out of labor disputes. The developer agrees to use exclusively union labor and Monroe County could save nearly \$650,000 by agreeing to the contract in advance. This is the fourth time the County has agreed to a PLA for a major project in recent years, and we are proud to support one for this project. We understand the importance of guaranteed contracts for unionized labor, and in the case of this construction project, the County is also able to save taxpayer money. It is a true win-win scenario for all sides.

Our vision for the residents of Charlotte is to have a vibrant campus, close to home, filled with students pursuing education which provides a path to a better future. It is a project that we are very excited about and we anticipate its opening in 2017.

2015 City of Rochester Owner-Occupant Roofing Program

The City of Rochester is offering financial assistance up to \$12,000 for roof replacement for owner-occupied single-family home owners located in the city of Rochester. The assistance will cover the cost of a roof replacement and other related repairs such as gutters, downspouts, roof flashing, and minor chimney repair. Other work repairs not related to the roof are ineligible. Preexisting damages to the interior of the property caused by a leaking roof are not covered through the program. The work will be undertaken by an approved city contractor. Owners are not allowed to complete their own work.

There will be two rounds of funding available for the program. The first round will be "quadrant-based" where 75 names (pre-applications) will be randomly selected from a pool of applicants at each City Neighborhood Service Center. A total of 30% of the selections will be senior citizens. The open application period for this round will run from: February 18 - March 17, 2015 with the drawing to be held on March 18, 2015.

The second round of funding will be "city-based" where names will be selected from a city-wide pool of applicants at a central location to be announced. The open application period for this round will run from May 19 – June 18, 2015 with the drawing to be held on June 19, 2015.

Interested homeowners must submit a pre-application at their nearest Neighborhood Service Center between February 18 and March 17. Charlotte residents go to the Northwest Center at 71 Parkway, 428-7620 to apply. Lake Ontario Plan Update From Matt Haag, Council Member-at-Large, City of Rochester



Currently, the way in which the St. Lawrence River and Lake Ontario are regulated with regard to water levels and flow, are based around the science of the 1950's. Roughly 15 years ago, the Canadian and United States Governments, along with environmental experts, the public, and other stakeholders, launched an initiative to study what was currently being done and what could be improved. Last year, the International Joint Commission issued the report and made the recommendation that the Plan be implemented immediately. The new plan which is based on updated science, would assist with both the flow and levels of the St. Lawrence River and Lake Ontario. According to Matt Haag, Council Member-at-Large for the City of Rochester, "Plan 2014 is balanced, thoughtful, and uses the latest science to manage the waters of Lake Ontario. There are many people and interests who rely on a healthy lake, and Plan 2014 is accountable to all of them."







Exams. Given the difficulty of the exams, we
encourage them to take them in January and possibly "get
them out of the way" for the hectic end of the year. For students who don't score as high as they may like, they are welcome to take them again in June.

Our students have taken some really great field trips lately. **Mr. Elliott's** AP English Literature students went to GEVA Theater to see a performance of "Little Shop of Horrors" on February 12th. Other classes have visited the RMSC Planetarium, the George Eastman House, the Hochstein School of Music and MCC's Brighton Campus.

CHS is fortunate to have four (wonderful) Hillside Work Scholarship advocates on site at all times. Hillside is a mentoring program to help students stay on track for graduation. There are attendance and grade requirements to enroll in the program and once enrolled students can receive afterschool homework help, job readiness training and just general support. Many of the kids get jobs at Wegmans through their en-

rollment in the program. They participate in a lot of fun extra-curricular activities too. Recently they went to see "Pippin" at the Auditorium Theatre and are going there again to see "Annie". Cooking classes, bowling excursions – they do it all. It's a great program for our students and we're thankful to have Hillside as a Community Partner!

We'd like to send kudos to **Mrs. Beasley's Environmental Club.** Her "Green Team" has many "jobs" around the school including school beautification and recycling. They create posters & send e-mails reminding us all how to conserve energy in this very large building. They go through the building before school breaks and turn off lights, unplug Smart boards and small appliances, staying on top of the important job of energy conservation. This conservation is entered into a spreadsheet which generates funds for our school from the RCSD's Green Initiative.
