

The Scholarship Committee assigns a weight to each of these categories and independently scores each application.

Fall Preparations at Creative Beginnings-Lakeside!

e are busily preparing for the upcoming school year at Creative Beginnings-Lakeside (Formerly Lakeside Child and Family Center). We are trying to build our fall enrollment so that we meet our capacity; you will often see our staff out in the community at events handing out fliers. We currently have one classroom that is Early Pre-K (EPK), for qualifying city children who will be 3 by December 1st which is full. We have several openings for our Universal Pre-K (UPK) program at this time. If you know anyone who has a child, lives in the city of Rochester and will be 4 by December 1st, please send them down to our center to register today. Take advantage of the amazing experience of being a part of our program through parent-engagement activities, holiday gatherings and a wonderful sense of community that our center has with our families. We are also hoping to provide wrap-around care to the families as an added service.

Universal Pre-K is a program offered at Creative-Beginning Lakeside and funded through the Rochester City School District. The classroom offers a ratio of 3:18 with an early-childhood certified teacher and two assistant teachers. The classroom teachers have over 13 -years of experience in a preschool setting and the assistant teachers all have a Childs Development Associates.

We implement a High Scope early childhood education approach that is beneficial for a preschool setting and supports kindergarten readiness. This curriculum focuses on problem solving, routine, social emotional interactions, ELA and Math. We build on learning opportunities by extending children's thinking/reasoning through open-ended small group activities. These engaging, rich activities are based off the children's interest and what they already know. Our goal is to build on that and take their learning to the next level.

Update: New York State Senate **Joe Robach**

Drug Take Back Act Becomes Law

ew York has an opioid epidemic demanding attention now. Communities, law enforcement, elected officials and pharmacies holding special takeback days is just not enough. More aggressive efforts to curb the tide of opioid addiction are essential.

That is why I am pleased that legislation that I supported in the Senate to create the "Drug Take Back Act" was recently signed into law.

The new law establishes a unified statewide drug take-back program that will reduce medication misuse and save government and taxpayer money. It will also provide significantly more opportunities for New Yorkers to ensure the safe disposal of unused drugs.

Specifically, the "Drug Take Back Act" will hold pharmaceutical manufacturers responsible for all costs of the take-back program, ranging from public education and awareness to drug collection, transport and destruction. The Act will further require chain pharmacies and mail-order pharmacies to provide consumers with collection options including drop boxes and prepaid mail-back envelopes.

Providing New Yorkers with safe and accessible disposal methods will help prevent addiction, which often starts with misuse of unused medications. This new law not only helps address the opioid epidemic, it makes sure all medications are properly disposed of and do not contaminate our water supplies.

New DMV Downtown Office

n case you missed it, last month I joined with Rochester Mayor Lovely Warren and Monroe County Clerk Adam J. Bello to announce that we reached an agreement to bring the first full-time Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) Office to Downtown Rochester in 15 years.

I am particularly excited and proud to have had the opportunity to secure \$425,000 in State funding that helped pave the way for this announcement and make such a worthy project possible.

The fact is that DMV services remain as essential today as ever before and it is critical that we are making these services as accessible and widely available in our community as possible. There is no doubt that a downtown DMV will enhance Rochester's quality of life for many years to come.

The new full-time Downtown DMV Office will be located at 200 E. Main St., conveniently co-located with the City of Rochester's Parking Violations Bureau and the Rochester Traffic Violations Agency, which will make it easier for customers to take care of several motor vehicle tasks in a single trip. The Office will also be in close proximity to a new U.S. Social Security Office, the Mortimer Street Parking Garage and the Regional Transit Service Transit Center.

Expanding access to DMV and other government services for our neighbors living in the city goes to the core of what our mission as public servants is all about — improving services and enhancing programs that enable families and individuals to grow and thrive.

I am looking forward to celebrating with all City of Rochester residents the Downtown DMV grand opening in the very near future.

Update: Molly Clifford Northwest City Council Member **New RPD Lakeside Headquarters**


y now I hope you've heard about the plans to build a new Lake Section headquarters for the Rochester Police Department at the corner of Lake Avenue and West Ridge Road, the old Piehler parking lots. This means that the Lake Section of the Patrol Division will move from 1099 Jay St, as will the Northwest Neighborhood Service Center (NSC) and its police and civilian employees, who are moving from 71 Parkway.

As many of you know, the plan to establish RPD section offices has been around for awhile. This turned out to be "easier said than done," due to the fact that the space requirements for the police officers, staff, cars,



This will bring the NW NSC and Lake Section to a more central location in the Northwest Quadrant and will be much more accessible to the public than the current configuration. While there are still outstanding questions about the potential impact on traffic, the timing of the construction, design, etc., this is great news for Northwest residents.

This is the beginning of the project and there will be more opportunities for public input along the way. This is another significant step in the redevelopment of the area in and around the Eastman Business Park and is exciting for the Northwest Quadrant and Rochester as a whole!

Lake Avenue Welcome Sign Update


On June 2nd, our flagship welcome sign to Charlotte was destroyed by a drunk driver; therefore, the association is faced with an

the post and plants.




