CCA and LYAM Partnership

~ Message from CCA President, Jonathan Hardin

he Charlotte Community Association (CCA) and Leadership Academy for Young Men (LAYM) hosted a round-table discussion regarding the busing system and student/resident conflicts in the community on February 11, 2019 at the LAYM. The meeting was well attended by about 30 residents and professionals from governmental agencies and private associations/groups. We discussed the busing of the children to LAYM and assisting the school in keeping the students in school during school hours. Also discussed were the issues that some of the students face on a daily basis along with the need for community support.

Our community support starts with increased CCA participation with the students and the staff at LAYM. Moving forward, the CCA Board of Directors has agreed to adopt the JROTC program and JROTC will continue their participation in our events this coming year. Any student from the LAYM is also invited to participate in our community events, picnic, or serve on any of our committees and, accordingly, CCA will provide community service hours to those student who participate. You will see the results of our partnership via a GoodNeigbhor Grant that we received from the Rochester Area Community Foundation.

Our schools are in crisis and we need everyone taking a role in improving them and reaching our children. These children attend school in Charlotte and, while they are here, they are members of our community. We must never forget that these students are our future leaders and deserve our guidance. We must play a role in helping to lift this school, as well as 12 other schools in the Rochester City School District (RCSD), out of receivership status. We as a board are committing to playing a larger role in working with **Principal Moore and Vice Principal Wango.**

RCSD and CCA are partnering to provide magnets having contact information for residents to call if they notice a student on someone's private property or out of school during school hours. The magnets will be made available by request at our monthly meetings.

We are seeking a diverse group of minority men from our community to join forces with us as members of PAC-TAC, as well as teach them to reach out to the kids rooming the streets before school and mentor the truants about the importance of getting to class on time.

We have spoken to clerks at Sunoco Station (corner of Denise Road and Lake Ave.). They have agreed to stop selling to the kids during school hours. They are also going to start calling 3 1 1 to report their truancy to the school.

Last year we received more volunteer hours of service at our events and fundraiser from the LAYM's JROTC program than we received from our

Two Proposals Received for Port of Rochester Development

he City of Rochester has received two responses to its Request for Proposals (RFP) for mixed-use development at the Port of Rochester, according to the Northwest Quadrant Administrator Tammi Herron and City Councilwoman Molly Clifford. At the

March 4th CCA meeting, the community learned that the two proposals received by the deadline of January 28th were from PathStone Corporation, a Rochesterbased private non-profit organization, and Flaherty & Collins Properties, a company based out of Indianapolis, IN. Both organizations specialize in urban developments that include affordable housing. The RFP calls for at least 20% of any proposed residential units must be affordable for a period of 15 years.

As recommended in the RFP, both developers contacted the CCA to learn more about the community's wishes as conveyed in the Charlotte Community Vision Plan for the Port of Rochester and Surrounding Areas. Representatives from the developer team led by PathStone met multiple times with members of the CCA Community Development Committee to discuss the team's ideas for meeting the

RFP requirements while also addressing the concerns of the community. Although the committee did not completely embrace their proposal, the PathStone team was very committed to the process of working with the community. A

representative of Flaherty & Collins also spoke briefly with the committee co-chairs before submitting their proposal, but the company did not share any details of their proposal.

At this time, the CCA neither endorses nor opposes either of the two developers. The next steps are that the City Planners will review the proposals and negotiate a contract by May, and then proceed towards City Council approval of the actual land sale to the chosen developer in August.

Broken Windows, Trash, & More to Come

In late November, the association was made aware that the windows at Lakesiders Bar and Grill had been smashed and the exterior plate of the double plated glass was broken. The association at that time reported this to the Neighborhood Service Center (NSC) Administrator and have since asked for updates. The NSC Administrator for the NW is Tammi Herrion and she reported to the association at the February 4th meeting that her office had made attempts to contact the owner, but they were unsuccessful. She advised us that there were also additional underlining circumstances related to this incident resulting in prolonged time to fix the broken windows.

CCA has filed to obtain more information through the Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) to obtain a better understanding of the problem. Stay tuned

CYAA (2019 season preview)


B aseball fans, the Charlotte Youth Athletic Association (CYAA) 2019 season (it's 66th) is about to begin. I'm happy to report that last year, 185 boys and girls (ages 4-16) and their families were able to have a fun filled baseball season.

Just to recap, the kids and parents will come to one of our 5 registration dates in March at the Holy Cross School cafeteria or Gym. Then in mid-April, we ask the parent or guardian of each registered child to attend our Parent meeting at the Holy Cross School gym to welcome new and returning players, and families and go over general information and rules, as well as age group specific league information. On or about the 3rd week in April, the players will start reporting to our baseball fields at Ontario Beach Park. There is a 2-week player evaluation period for each age group that is used to determine player's skills, for the purpose of dividing them in to evenly matched teams. Once teams are selected, uniforms are handed out. This includes a hat, jersey and baseball socks (parents supplied baseball pants). Our different age groups will play regularly scheduled games Monday-Saturday from 6-8pm (twice a week) from early May to early July.

The players will be able to participate in a Skills-Challenge Day, on the first Saturday in June. Each age group tests their hitting, throwing and running skills. Each child receives a participation medal and the top 3 finishers in each skill get a 1st, 2nd or 3rd place medal. A free hot dog, chips and drink for players and families are provided by **CYAA** and our friends at

the Ontario Beach Park Program Committee (**OBPPC**). The **CYAA** also partners with the **Rochester Red Wings** to sell tickets to players and families to watch a Saturday night game in June at Frontier Field. The kids will get to walk on the field prior to the game and see fireworks after the game.

Each age group will culminate their regular season with a Trophy and Pizza night at the end of June. All players receive a trophy. Players and families are invited to stay for pizza and a drink on us, compliments of a donation by **Wegmans**.



Proposal: Pilot Program Allowing Ads on City Assets

city Council will be voting this month on a proposed pilot program to allow advertising on some City assets as a way of raising revenue and, in some cases, promoting special events. Efforts to implement this program in the past were stymied by concerns over the potential for "visual pollution" and a lack of clarity over what kinds of advertising would be allowed.

The pilot will attempt to address these issues and test the market to see if its use as a revenue generator are viable. For starters, the pilot will focus on Downtown Rochester and large special events (Park Avenue, Jazz Fest), with the idea that attendance numbers make them more attractive to potential


advertisers. Supporters also believe that advertising in the city core is more acceptable to residents and visitors. "City assets" will include sidewalks (temporary chalking), skyways, and parking garages; will not include vehicles, rec centers or parks.

There will also be a review committee of potential advertisers and advertising plans. There are a number of Council members, myself included, who are concerned about the quality of the advertising as well as the type of products being advertised. The pilot allows more flexibility in decision making, but if the program continues after the pilot period, the City will

have to figure out how to regulate content, if people so desire. Personally, I do not think that it would be worth the revenue if we are advertising Diabetic Test Strips!!

Finally, there will be a process during the pilot for other interested parties to seek approval

for advertising in areas outside of downtown. Charlotte merchants, for example, might be interested in sidewalk chalking around the marina to direct visitors to their establishments. Food for thought! Happy to hear your thoughts, as always.



When Rochester's Hospitals All Got Sick (First Thursday Local History Series) –

Thursday, April 4 at 2 p.m. 1918 was a busy year in Rochester, what with New York granting women suffrage, the start of Prohibition , and a world war raging in Europe. But everything faded into the background when the first cases of Spanish flu began showing up in Rochester's hospital wards. 


