Message from the CCA President - Jonathan Hardin

would like to thank CCA, our members, sponsors, partners, volunteers and the Leadership Academy for Young Men (LAFYM) Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) program for making this a GREAT YEAR. We have continued to service our community and build lasting relationships this year, while struggling to maintain board members and community volunteers. Please consider joining the board, a committee, or volunteer at the next event to talk to neighbors about joining the association. Volunteers are the back bone of this association!

We provided two college scholarships for \$2,000.00, contributed to the Charlotte Youth Athletic Association, maintained the banners throughout Charlotte while adding 12 new banners from Denise Road to Pattonwood Drive. The Beautification Committee volunteers maintained all the container pots and flower beds from Ontario Beach Park to our flagship "Welcome to Charlotte" sign on Lake Avenue near Riverside Cemetery. Your hours of volunteer service and financial support help us continue this yearly commitment to Charlotte.

Additionally, our partnership with the LAFYM's JROTC program blossomed in 2019. These young men designed, built and embedded a new planter box around the "Historical River Street" sign on Lake Avenue, trimmed back the growth in St. John's Park and built some new outdoor seating for Engine 19. We can't thank them enough.

The students managed and operated the Charlotte Water Station for the Rochester Marathon this past September. They also will be volunteering at the our December events: the Christmas Tree Lighting and the 4th Annual Best of Charlotte.


I recently met with the new Principal of LAFYM, Dr. Djinga St. Louis and we both agreed to continue and grow our partnership in 2020. Next year we will open CCA's community service opportunities to all students at LAFYM from 7th grade to 12th grade. We will also revisit the idea of a Community Sponsored Junior/Senior Prom or Dance at LAFYM next year; watch for more information.

Most importantly is the partnership that we have with neighborhood association in the Northwest quadrant and across the City of Rochester. This past year I had the pleasure of not only serving as President of CCA, but also the Chair of Rochester Many Neighbors Building Neighborhoods (MNBN). Since 2016 this organization has served as an umbrella for neighborhood associations from all four (4) quadrants of the City of Rochester and our moto is "We are Stronger Together".

This year MNBN reviewed the 2019/2020 Budget and started sounding the alarms about the pending "Brownouts" or closures of Fire Houses across the City. We took our fight to City Hall, the Rochester Fire Department, City Council, the Media and ultimately to the streets in

Community Development Committee Annual Report

The CCA's Community Development Committee, cochaired by Sue Roethel and Lindy Litwak, has been active all year, meeting monthly with a core group of very dedicated volunteers. The committee continues the work of refining the Charlotte Community Vision Plan that sprung from the charrette (planning day) held in November 2017.

Among the committee's projects are several simultaneous investigations into the various ideas presented in the Vision Plan, such as installing a public ice skating rink, boutique hotel, and maritime museum/ aquarium/education center; expanding lake and river cruises and adding water taxis; offering year-round activities; and improving transportation options and traffic flow. Several subcommittees formed to explore funding and partnership opportunities to grow these ideas into reality.

One such subcommittee monitored the City's Request for Proposals (RFP) for development at the Port of Rochester, which invited potential developers to reach out to the CCA. So far the team has met and/or corresponded with three developers and provided the City with feedback. As the RFP process continues, the committee will actively seek to engage potential developers and share the community's vision for development of the Port.

Another subcommittee reached out to CSX about the disposition of the railroad tracks and the possibility of repurposing them for trolley service into Charlotte. The team learned that there are no plans to abandon the land that the tracks currently sit on, and they won't allow any trains on their tracks other than their own. A CSX train makes deliveries to Boxart businesses twice per week, but

they will not be running trains north of that.

A subcommittee engaged in the development of the City's Comprehensive Plan Roc 2034. Members attended public meetings in June, and then sent a letter to the City in August with feedback.

Another subcommittee reached out to the City to learn more about the proposed project to perform maintenance work on Lake Ave. north of Pattonwood Dr. The project is still pending.

A subcommittee met with NYS Senator Joe Robach and then with the Director of Monroe County Parks Department about refurbishing the Roger Robach Community Center and winterizing parts of Ontario Beach Park for year-round use. Of particular interest is creating an ice skating/roller skating rink, basketball courts, and establishing an annual Fall international bazaar.

Another subcommittee has investigated what other waterfront communities are doing. An outreach to Hart Hotels, a family owned business based in Buffalo, is awaiting a reply. They have hotels in Clayton, Watkins Glen and Canaseraga that are low-profile and boutique style. The team also learned that a national marine sanctuary, as well as an indoor water park on Lake Ontario, are two projects that the City of Oswego is building as part of its Downtown Revitalization Initiative.

Other ongoing investigations are the potential for cruise ships, pedestrian ferry service, and Seth Green (aquaculture).

The Community Development Committee will continue to meet monthly in 2020 as well.

New Health & Wellness Program for Seniors




