Community Development Committee Update – New RFP for the Port of Rochester released on November 26, 2019

new Request for Proposals (RFP) for mixed-use development at the Port was released on November 26th and again referred to our Community Vision Plan. The previous RFP, issued in November 2018, failed to meet the needs of the City planners and the Charlotte community.

Members of the CCA's Committee
Development Committee met on November
25th with Gary Kirkmire, Commissioner of
Neighborhood and Business Development
(NPD) about the RFP rollout. The most notable
change from the RFP released one year ago
was new language about the Port being one of
the City's Opportunity Zones. This is a federal
HUD program to attract investors by offering
tax incentives for developing in specific
designated areas that are depressed. As in
2018, the new RFP calls for at least 20% of any
proposed residential units are required to be

"affordable," but the definition of "affordable" has changed. In 2018, it was that the units needed to be affordable to households earning at or below 60% of the Average Median Income (AMI). Now it's up to 80% of AMI. (Note: In 2018, one source cites AMI as \$30,784, and another source cites AMI as \$56,969. Either way, it's a big difference.)

The RFP is posted on the City's website at <u>cityofrochester.gov</u>. The deadline for proposals is February 21, 2020. Submitted proposals will be reviewed in March.

As previously reported, the CCA board met in October with a developer from Louisville, Kentucky who presented a workshop in Rochester about the HUD Opportunity Zone Program. This developer is very eager to tap into the Opportunity Zone funds for investors interested in developing at the Port. **Mr.**

Clifford Turner of Land Development Services, Inc. and his Rochester-based "RFP Committee Chair, "Ms. Ruth Brooks Ward are aggressively seeking the support of the Charlotte community for their proposal submission. Ms. Ward is a real estate broker from All the Way Realty Group.

On December 14th, Mr. Turner and Ms. Brooks Ward hosted a meeting by invitation to some community members to discuss their proposal plans. About 25 people attended, in addition to several unknown people from Mr. Turner's development team—some from Louisville and some from Rochester.

The meeting was a mix of interesting information (i.e. they want to build a 50-room hotel complex with 20 condos plus office and retail space and NO apartments), and contentious behavior on the part of the developer team. They brought no



handouts and seemed ill-prepared to answer people's questions. There seemed to be confusion on the developer team's part about who we are and what our community actually wants, even though our Community Vision Plan is mentioned in the RFP and has been posted on the CCA website for over a year. Mr. Turner, at one point, told the group that he has received the support of **Mayor Lovely Warren** and that she sent him to meet with us.

Despite the potential for us to build an early relationship with a developer responding to the RFP, the community members who were present at that meeting came away from it with the impression that Mr. Turner and his team would not be a good choice for this community. People were, in fact, quite upset and angry about the disrespectful way they were treated when attempting to voice their opinions. There was some good exchange of information, but anything positive was clouded by a lack of understanding on the part of the developer team.




Leadership Academy for Young Men's Community Engagement Team Announcement





A Note from New County Legislator, Yversha Roman

f we have not met, my name is **Yversha Roman**. Starting in January, I will serve as the new County Legislator for District 26; LD 26 includes parts of Charlotte, Maplewood, North Gates and Greece.

As an Alumni of the Aquinas Institute and a homeowner in the district—I am honored to represent an area that molded me into the person I am today. With approximately 20 years of not-for-profit work experience my hope is to be your voice through the perspective of a Human Service provider.

I am excited to see the new enthusiasm and interest in County Government and encourage you to stay connected and become aware. Feel free to follow me on Facebook at *Yversha M Roman for Monroe County Legislature* or read along here monthly. Transparent government happens when information is shared with all.

This past month we saw how government responds when we pay attention. Seven days after **Adam Bello** won his election for Monroe County Executive the County

Legislature met using the "Matters of Emergency" procedure to introduce the Republican endorsed CABLE (Checks and Balances for Legislative Equality) Act of 2019. This Act would amend the County Charter to limit the power and independence of the incoming County Charter to see the charter to see th

independence of the incoming County Executive.

By doing so, the law skipped the normal committee process and could have been signed into law in December. Yet, due to pressure and advocacy by the community, approximately 72-hours after the introduction of the Act, it was withdrawn.

There is much work to be done but, I am hopeful that with a more collaborative and accountable County Legislature we can do the work to ensure our community becomes as vibrant as we all wish for it to be.

harlotte development season is upon us again with the new RFP that was just issued by the city. Last time we had at least two proposals that were denied by the city administration, and we were told it would not come back out until February of 2020. Somehow, some way, there was a developer from the south who stated they were hand-picked by the Mayor to bring said development to our area, and the RFP was reissued specifically for them.

The issue I have is this: why them? Where did they

come from, and how did the Mayor choose them from so many developers across the country? Where is the transparency behind such decisions?

I have my own developers coming up Jose Peo from the Carolinas in January 2020 to meet with CCA, the Charette Steering and Vision Planning team, as well as the rest of City Council members, in order to tour the Parcel 1 area in Charlotte. They have already completed both an aquarium development, as well as a public ice-skating park in areas they are invested in. They came highly recommended through a military veteran connection I have, since I constantly try and get my old friends to come up to see me by bragging about Rochester all the time.

This is the kind of proactive and assertive mindset that I will bring to City Council; instead of waiting for the answer, I will go find one and get it done.

Lakeside Winterfest and the Polar Plunge

he Lakeside Winterfest and the Polar Plunge will once again be held at Ontario Beach Park the weekend of **February 8-9, 2020**. The weekend kicks off at **noon Saturday** with an array of family friendly winter activities. (Note: location change; most activities will take place in and adjacent to the Rodger Robach Community Center and in Ontario Beach Park.)

A huge, heated tent will be home to perennial festival favorites the **Chilly Chili Challenge** and the **Lake Ontario Wine and Craft Beer festival,** as well as other vendors, food options, and entertainment by the Neil Van Dorn band.

Outdoors, enjoy an ice carving demonstration, or enter the highly contested snow sculpture contest, with cash prizes to winners in three categories; youth 12 and under, adults, and groups and families. Other activities include horse drawn wagon rides, dog sled demos, fun games, and contests organized by the City of Rochester, Rec On the Move staff, and a 'fat tire' winter fun bike ride (some bikes will be available for loan), or just take in the splendor of Lake Ontario in the winter.

At **6 pm**, the action shifts to the Port of Rochester, William A. Johnson Jr. Port Terminal. Snuggle into one of the terminal's numerous eateries, and enjoy and snack and a drink as you marvel at a gigantic winter fireworks display over the river. Afterwards, explore the Charlotte local bar and restaurant scene, and

catch up with friends you haven't seen since summer. These events are organized by the all-volunteer Ontario Beach Park Program Committee, and sponsored by the City of Rochester, Monroe County, merchants, Charlotte Community Association, CITY Newspaper, and Wegmans. On **Sunday, Feb.9th**, the fun continues with the **annual Polar Plunge at noon**. More than 1,000 winter enthusiasts are expected to dive into the icy waters of Lake Ontario to benefit Special Olympics. Free off-site parking and shuttle service are available for all plungers and spectators. Shuttles from the Greece Arcadia High School parking lot, 120 Island Cottage Rd. to the Polar Plunge site will be available from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Participants and spectators are strongly urged to take advantage of this transportation option, as parking at the Port is limited. Developer Brings us a Plate of Garbage *A commentary by Councilman-Elect, Jose Peo*

Like some of you, I received a letter in the mail from Lovely's RFP Committee Chair, Ruth E. Brooks Ward, who invited us to come to a meeting that Saturday (yes, 3 days later) to meet with the Mayor's developer of choice. I immediately made some maneuvers to open up my calendar, in the hopes of finally having a developer who can create our vision, and meet the parameters of what the Mayor wanted as well.

To say I was highly disappointed is a vast understatement.

I was upset at both the lack of preparation, and the abundance of disrespect that their entire crew showed us. Not only did they show up with a single copy of their handouts for approximately 30 people, but they even had the wrong

lighthouse and lake on the front of one of them. We were forced to utilize our imagination to understand their ideas for our neighborhood, which really was not that hard since they simply said "a 2-3 story hotel and condos overlooking Lake Street" (yes, street). When the schematics from the architect finally made its way to me, I witnessed an 8-year-old Lego version of what unpaid college kids drew up for us.

When asked questions, their replies were a mixed-use of fluffy words and inappropriate arm touching, with a sprinkling of talking over the person simply trying to finish their question.

"We all want to be winners."

"It doesn't matter where the money is coming from."

"I have won numerous awards for my developments."

"I know the person in D.C. by their first

name."

"We need to have this done by October of this year, 2019."

I had enough, and I could no longer hold it in. I expressed my complete disgust in their ineffective and completely unprepared delivery. I told them they wasted our time, and I refused to stay there to hear anymore, then immediately got up and left.

After the meeting, Ruth then called all of Charlotte "racist" for not wanting any more low-income housing in the brandnew development, which is adjacent to the high rises and townhouses that already cater to those in our great city who are most in need.

We CANNOT allow this hand-picked developer to push their own agenda on us; we deserve much better.




