2020 Scholarship Announcement

It's that time of year again, as college bound seniors start their search for financial aid.

This year the *Charlotte Community Association* (CCA) is pleased to announce that again, two scholarships will be awarded to college bound students who are residents of the Charlotte community or attend the Leadership Academy for Young Men.

The CCA will award one \$2,000 award which is made possible through community fundraising and membership donations.

Another award of \$2,000 is provided by a fund created in memory of *Edward Watson*, a Charlotte resident and former Charlotte High student.

The requirements for both scholarships are as follows: To qualify for the *Edward Watson Scholarship*, the college bound senior must attend the Leadership Academy for Young Men (formerly Charlotte High School). To qualify for the *CCA Scholarship*, the college bound senior must reside in the Charlotte neighborhood and attend any school, public or private. All applications will be reviewed by the Scholarship Committee.

For many years the Charlotte Community Association has offered scholarships to students who qualify based on academics, community service and extra-curricular activities. We are pleased to continue this tradition as well as help facilitate with the **Edward Watson Scholarship**.

he 2020 Charlotte Youth Athletic Association (**CYAA**) begins it's 67th season!

Last year, 188 boys and girls (ages 4-16) and their families were able to have a fun filled baseball season. After Registration and Parent Meeting, the players were on the baseball field 2 days later, being evaluated for skill and team matching over the next 2 weeks. All evaluations are geared to the player's age. Once teams are selected, players received a jersey, hat and baseball socks (parents supply baseball pants). Games were scheduled Monday-Saturday, 6-8pm twice a week, from mid May to mid July.

The players looked forward to **Skill Challenge Day** mid season. Each age group tested their hitting, throwing, and running skills. Players received a participation medal, and the top 3 finishers in each skill got a 1st 2nd or 3rd place medal. Food and drink are provided to players and family by **CYAA** and our friends at the Ontario Beach Park Program Committee (**OBPPC**).

Partnering with **Rochester Red Wings**, tickets were sold for a Saturday night game. The kids got to walk on the field prior to the game and watched the fireworks after the game.

The regular season culminated with a **Trophy and Pizza Night**. All players received a trophy. Players and families enjoyed pizza and a drink, compliments of a donation by **Wegmans**.

We plan to continue this format for 2020. New will be offering discounted tickets for a **CYAA Day** at **Seabreeze Amusement Park**. Stay tuned!





Charlotte's Links to Football and to the NFL

s the NFL celebrates its 100th season, consider the very 'local' connections to football here in Charlotte.

Joseph McShea was a talented athlete who graduated from the first Charlotte High in 1919. He participated in several sports. After marriage, Joe lived on Grassmere Park, and later on Beach Avenue.

After attending University of Rochester, Joe signed a contract to play football for Leo Lyons and the Jeffersons, earning \$25.00 per game!

Leo Lyons was born in 1892 in Fairport and started playing football for the Rochester 'Jeffersons' in 1908 at age 16. He later became their coach, manager, and owner. In 1919, the Jeffersons won the city's semi-pro championship. They then played the Canton Bulldogs, managed by Jim Thorpe.

Lyons is also remembered as one of the pioneer founders of the National Football League. On September 17, 1920, Lyons represented Rochester at a meeting of the nation's pro team managers, where

they created the American Professional Football Association. The league became the "National Football League" in 1922. The Rochester Jeffersons were charter members of the NFL, one of 14 original league teams. The Jeffs played in the league from 1920-25.

Lyons lost his NFL franchise in 1928, started a paint business in the 30s, and moved to Beach Avenue in Charlotte. He served as "Honorary Historian" of the NFL from 1965, collecting memorabilia, until his death in 1976.

Lyons was present at the opening of the Hall of Fame in 1963. Although nominated several times, he was never inducted into the Hall of Fame.

Thanks to **Tom McShea**, who provided info on his grandfather, Joe McShea, Sr. for an exhibit on local sports at the Greece Historical Society. 

Help for Charlotte Community!

he Greece Emergency Food Shelf (GEFS) was created in 1977 as an emergency food pantry serving the Town of Greece and Charlotte. Through its used clothing from 9 to 11 AM Mondays through partnership with Foodlink, GEFS helps people in Greece and Charlotte by providing non-perishable food, nutritious fresh vegetables and fruits, and refrigerated and frozen foods. While the organization has always delivered food to its clients, in 2018 it added an option for people to come to the food shelf to choose their own food.

The Food Shelf relies on food and monetary donations from the community for its support. Monetary donations help purchase food from Foodlink at a significant discount. Food donations can be dropped off at community collection boxes in the Greece Library and the Community Center, or at the food shelf at 500 Maiden Lane on Mondays 9 to 11 AM, Tuesdays 10 AM to noon, Wednesdays 4 to 6 PM and Saturdays 9 to 11 AM.

People in need of emergency food can call the hotline at 683-9674 Monday through Friday between 9 am and 3 pm. All clients must be verified over the phone before receiving food through delivery or onsite.


The Greece Ecumenical Clothing Closet (GCC), located next door to the Food Shelf, is where people can come to receive and donate gently

Saturdays. They also have a donation shed in the parking lot where items can be left any time. Both organizations serve residents of the town of Greece and Charlotte neighborhood of the city of Rochester. All services are free.

Volunteers are always needed. There are many opportunities, including verifying clients, assisting clients onsite, sorting and stocking, and delivering food to clients.



A Greece Resident's Career in the CIA
