MT Ed is thrilled to make its home in the historic Penny Arcade in Charlotte. Formerly housed at 75 Stutson St., the desire to grow our program offering indicated a need to have our own dedicated space. The space at 4785 Lake Ave. is a perfect home for MT Ed with its wide open spaces, a stage, and proximity to outdoor spaces.

Beginning the week following July 4th, students in **grades 2-8** can participate in 2 week camps in which they will rehearse and perform a musical. This summer the musicals will be: *Peter Pan, Jr., Night at the Wax Museum, Mary Poppins, Jr., and The Little Mermaid, Jr.*

What makes our program different than other theatre camps in the area? MT Ed's Artistic Director, **Tina Crandall-Gommel** is a Masters degree teacher with an undergraduate degree in theatre and dance. Her staff is made up of qualified educators who provide programming in a nurturing environment, tailored to the developmental needs of program participants and a focus on the whole child. Our campers experience daily outdoor time, like playing on the playground, sand time or yoga at the beach, or simply taking a walk. MT Ed has a

low program participation cap which allows for meaningful learning experience.

Summer at MT Ed also brings our **teen program**, which will be submitted for participation in the Rochester Fringe Festival. This year, our teens will rehearse and perform the regional premiere of *The Lightning Thief*, the Percy Jackson Musical. Our performances in past Fringe Festivals have earned us Critics Choice recognition and high praise in the media. We also have a program for our **Tiny Talents, ages 4-6**. This summer, our smallest performers will participate in a one week, half day camp exploring theatre, and dance with a

Remembering Bob Stevenson and Mike Parker

Charlotte lost two giants in March. Both Bob and Mike were tireless workers who promoted the area and encouraged others to join in the celebration of their neighborhood.

Bob Stevenson

Bob Stevenson served as the Northwest District City Councilman from 1987 to 2007. Before that, he enjoyed a 30-year career as a science teacher, which included a stint as a physics teacher at Charlotte High School. Bob was without a doubt the “Energizer Bunny” of the Northwest, attending numerous meetings throughout his district and participating in countless community events. He supported the NET offices as they transitioned into Neighborhood Service Centers. He championed the Genesee River through his support of the LWRP (Local Waterfront Revitalization Project) along with **Bill Davis** from the Charlotte-Genesee Lighthouse. Both were instrumental in promoting the Riverway Trail throughout the city and north through Charlotte, from Turning Point Park to the Bill Davis Overlook and the Lighthouse Trail. During his

time on City Council, Bob saw the repaving of Lake Avenue, the renovation of the Terminal Building and Robach Community Center


Bob and his wife Mary lived on Albemarle Street and were active in Pac-Tac and the Maplewood Neighborhood Association. What I remember most was that Bob served as an annual volunteer tour guide of the Maplewood Gorge during River Romance. It was sad that Mary had passed by the time he and Mary were honored in 2016 with a plaque in Maplewood to commemorate their years of tireless devotion to the area.





Jose Peo - NE City Councilman ~ Illegal Dirt Bikes and ATVs

Year after year the quality of life for residents in the City of Rochester has decreased incredibly due in large part to the illegal dirt bikes and ATVs on our streets. In the past few days, we have had two deaths, several accidents and a pedestrian nearly ran over by simply walking down the sidewalk.

We all know the danger being caused by the illegal dirt bikes and ATVs; simply educating the public will not be enough to curve the temptation of using them on our city streets, in public parks, trails and on sidewalks.

We must follow the lead of Buffalo Common Council and Albany City Council in curbing the use of these illegal vehicles in the City. Numerous complaints from residents and business owners are demanding action to be taken. Buffalo and Albany have taken a lead in reducing the use of illegal dirt bikes and ATVs. With that background, I am requesting City Council to consider the following legislation:

1. Prepare legislation that would impose and/or increase the fines for confiscated ATV's, dirt bikes and any type recreational vehicle that are known to be driven illegally on our city streets. In Albany they are fined \$650, as well as impose a \$2350 redemption fee to get them out of the impound. \$3000 is indeed a hefty price to pay,

and should deter people from even thinking of riding one of these illegal machines on our streets.

2. Give Rochester Police Department the tools necessary to move forward enforcing the laws currently in City Code, and allow RPD to re-image their "no pursuit" policy. This could be done by either utilizing drone technology, or have a portal for neighbors to submit information on addresses of where these illegal vehicles are being stored. This would eliminate the worry of high speed chases turning deadly.
3. Corporate Council can review the above to send back to council the current codes and make suggestions of additional language to be discussed by council.

I ask that if you support this proposed legislation to voice your support to Speak to Council. The next two Speak to Councils are May 11th and June 15th. You can Speak to Council by e-mailing your concerns directly to Council@Cityofrochester.gov or by phone to City Council's Office at 585-428-6175. Be sure to leave your contact information and ask that your comment be presented at the Speak to Council session.

Mike Parker

Mike Parker served as President of the CCA from 2010 through 2014. He and the board sponsored many projects, the most notable being the renovation of the Charlotte Village Cemetery. A yearly project during "Clean Sweep," the CCA got volunteers to clear debris and cut down brush. The CCA also sponsored the extensive tombstone restoration by the Seabees and raised the needed funding by sponsoring a HarborTown Belle cruise that raised over \$1,500.00. As a result of the 3-year project, the Seabees were honored by having a sign dedicated to them on a section of the Lake Ontario State Parkway (LOSP) and the City of Rochester erected a nautical flagpole in the cemetery in exchange for the countless volunteer hours.

Mike loved talking about nature and the Genesee River. During October River Romance, Mike led a guided tour of

Turning Point Park. His last tour was held in 2019 when he hosted a tour of the Charlotte Village Cemetery. In 2019, **Councilwoman Molly Clifford, Senator Joe Robach and OBPPC chairman Jim Farr** presented Mike with an award for his many years of service.

As President, Mike oversaw the volunteers at Kite Flight, Clean Sweep and events at the terminal building. Mike also volunteered with the Ontario Beach Park Program Committee, participating in events long after he left office. He was a fixture at every Harborfest and Lakeside Winter Celebration whether he was walking Pac-Tac or dressing as a polar bear for the Polar Plunge. He and his German Shepherd companion, Dyllon, could be seen walking miles each day to spot issues in his beloved Charlotte neighborhood.

Michael was passionate about the environment, animal welfare, civic causes and volunteering in the Charlotte. Mike, you will be missed.

What is PCIC? *

The Police Citizen Interaction Committee (PCIC) are monthly meetings, or in the case of the Rochester Police Chief's PCIC, bi-monthly meetings. Each Section's police Captain convenes the meetings, attended by Section staff and representatives from various neighborhoods groups within the Section. Topics of discussion may include crime patterns, quality of life issues, environmental concerns, problem locations and crime statistics. Meetings are intended to be interactive, where everyone is encouraged to participate in an open dialogue.

Lt. Waldo leads the NW PCIC for Lake Section. This group meets monthly the **third Tuesday of each month at 7 pm** to discuss crime activities in the NW.

The NW is basically RPD's Lake Section.

The meetings are via Zoom until further notice and you can email Lt. Waldo at Richard.Waldo@cityofrochester.gov for an invitation. Pre-pandemic, they were held at Aquinas Institute, 1127 Dewey Avenue, Rochester, NY 14613 on every third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 PM.

It's that time of year again as college bound seniors start their search for financial aid.

This year the **Charlotte Community Association (CCA)** is pleased to announce that again, two scholarships will be awarded to college bound students who are residents of the Charlotte community or attend the Leadership Academy for Young Men.




