his past year, even with the restrictions of COVID, we have seen many new people join our General Meetings via zoom. It has been a delight to meet new neighbors who care so much about the community.

Some of you have expressed an interest in becoming more involved, and this may be your opportunity. The CCA Board of Directors drives the organization's plan of work and provides input to the City regarding what is important to Charlotte citizens. We work closely with City departments to advocate for the quality of life you all are seeking. There are many opportunities to volunteer: You can assist one time at an event; or serve on a committee (there are 11 of them); or chair one of those committees (working with a board liaison); or most importantly, join the board.

Every year the CCA elects one half of its board to serve two-year terms. This year we elect a Vice President, Treasurer, Communications Officer and three Directors. There are only two absolute requirements: 1. You

must be a member in good standing of the CCA (dues paid), and 2. you must live within the environs of the Charlotte Community. (NOTE: Our bylaws do allow for <u>one</u> non-Charlotte resident, but that seat is, at this time, filled).

If you would like to serve on the board, there's a simple process to be nominated. Our bylaws require that we receive a letter of intent and resume (or summary of your relevant skills and experience) to infocharlottecca@gmail.com by the September CCA meeting; this year it's September 13, 2021.

What is a Community Association? Google states, A community association is not a governing body. What is the Process for Amending Bylaws and Why it's Done?

onprofit organizations review their Bylaws to assure legal compliance of internal governance practices and make sure the information for IRS Form 990 is accurate. Reflecting legal, ethical and responsible fundraising, effective governance and serve as the framework to help prevent or resolve conflicts as well as set expectations for procedures and workflows.

Nonprofit bylaws raise the level of accountability, transparency, and effectiveness of all nonprofit organizations to foster excellence in their services and

inspire trust. The Board structure (size, standing committees, etc.) can have an outline that speaks to attendance at meetings, engagement, indemnification, compensation agreements to protect and defend them from los or harm resulting from risk. A conflict of interest policy as well as a charter outlines the processes by which the rules are decided and enforced that establishes the structure of the nonprofit. 

Increasing Small Business Growth

he City of Rochester recently released a report about small business growth in the city, and we are crushing it in the Northwest Rochester. From June 2020 to June 2021, businesses in the Northwest district have received approximately \$1.5 MILLION in funding to help start their businesses, invest in equipment, and hire employees. Compare that to the estimated new business funding in the Northeast district (\$597,000) and the Southwest district (\$758,500), and you can see small businesses in the

Northwest district are growing at a pace double to triple that of other districts. I'm fully committed to assisting in any way I can, and confident that we are moving in the right direction. Our small businesses are re-emerging after the pandemic restrictions were lifting. CYAA (2021 season review)

ell, baseball fans, the Charlotte Youth Athletic Association (**CYAA**) 2021 season (its 68th) is in the books. I'm happy to report that 115 boys and girls (ages 4-12) and their families were able to have a fun filled baseball season. We had to cancel our 2020 Spring season and thankfully were able to have a very small (35 boys and girls), 1st ever Fall season because of Covid 19.

For our 2021 Spring season this all changed, because of COVID restrictions. We were forced to modify our registrations and do them all via a Facebook portal. Needless to say, continued worry by some parents and being unable to advertise properly affected our overall numbers. But, we persevered.

In early May, the players started reporting to our baseball fields at Ontario Beach Park. There was a 2 week player evaluation period for each age group that was used to determine player's skills, for the purpose of dividing them in to evenly matched teams. Once teams were selected then uniforms were handed out. This included a hat, jersey and baseball socks (parents supplied baseball pants). Our different age groups played regularly scheduled games Monday-Saturday (twice a week) from mid May to the late July.

In addition to playing games, the players were able to participate in a Skills Challenge Day, on the 3rd Saturday in June. Each age group tested their hitting, throwing and running skills.

Each child received a participation medal and the top 3 finishers in each skill got a 1^{st} 2^{nd} or 3^{rd} place medal.

A free hot dog, chips and drink for players and families were provided by **CYAA**.

The **CYAA** also partnered with **SEABREEZE AMUSEMENT PARK** to sell reduced price tickets to the park on July 11th
for players and Families. A generous donation by Wegmans
helped us feed a picnic lunch to everyone.

Each age group culminated their regular season and playoffs and with a Trophy night. All players received a trophy. In addition we plan on trying to hold another small Fall season.

Many thanks go out to our network of dedicated parents, volunteers and team sponsors and benefactors, both public and private. Your donation of time, effort, monetary, and in-kind support to the children is indeed commendable. The overall viability of the **CYAA** depends on these partnerships.

Our concession/bathroom/storage building continues to be a big hit, as it provides much needed storage capacity, clean bathrooms, and a low cost meal and snack alternative for families. We were pleased to add home-run fences in 2020, and other site upgrades are in our future plans.

As always we remained committed to giving our children and families, a safe, fun, family oriented baseball league, where friendship and teambuilding is stressed over wins and losses.

. A History of Seneca Park Zoo presented by Maureen Whalen

In April 2020, **Maureen Whalen** published the first and only comprehensive history of Seneca Park Zoo. Her book, A History of

Seneca Park Zoo, traces the Zoo's history from 1894 through 2013. In this program she'll track the many changes at the Zoo from its years as a menagerie collection emphasizing the entertainment value of animals to its current role as a leader in species conservation and habitat preservation. "Today," she likes to say, paraphrasing a vintage Oldsmobile commercial, "this is not your father's zoo." She'll also talk about some of the animals who have been favorites of zoo-goers over its twelve and a half decades. Whalen, who has been a docent at the Seneca Park Zoo since 2006, spent eight years searching through old newspaper accounts and annual reports, conducting interviews, and writing the history. She will bring copies of the book to the program.

She has been a volunteer at the Greece Historical Society since 2011 and curated their exhibits on the War of 1812, World War II, the Underground Railroad, Woman's Suffrage, and Prohibition. She also conducts walking tours of Holy Sepulchre Cemetery. In 2011 she co-wrote a history of the Rochester Public Library. She has been a docent at the Seneca Park Zoo since 2006 and is their historian as well. In April 2020, she published her book A History of Seneca Park Zoo.
