Spring: Board member **Barbara Lake** is bringing 4-H to LAFYM.

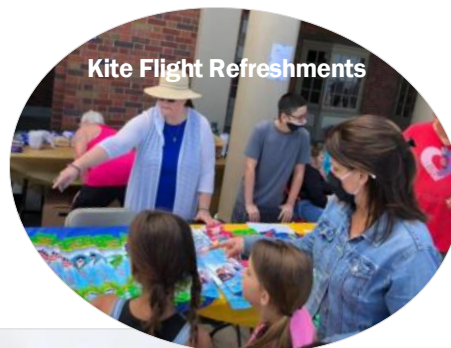
- ♦ **County Legislator Yversha Roman** will be helping students at LAFYM to

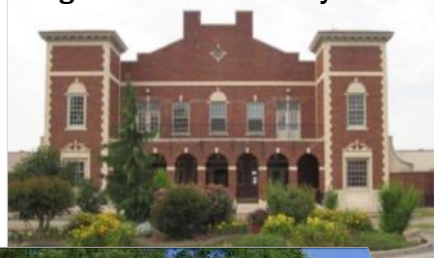

It is time to Renew your Membership for 2022

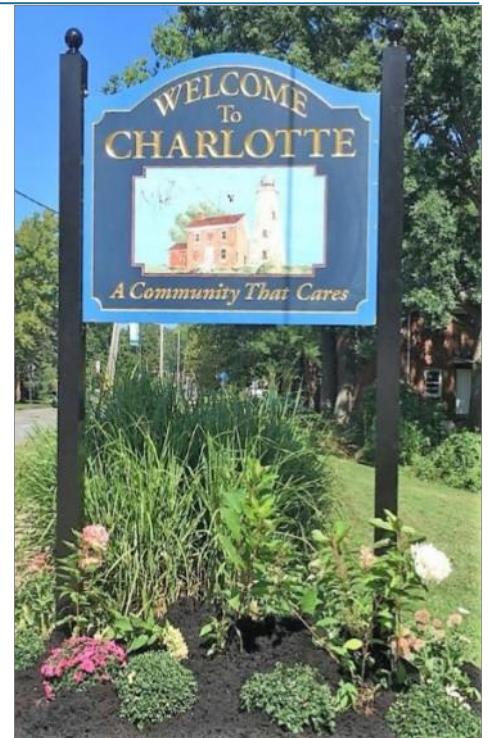

CCA By-laws Revision

An Ad-hoc committee of the Board of Directors was tasked with examining the by-laws for revision to bring them up to date with changes that have been approved by the board, or to make this an inclusive document which will serve with little revision in the future. These changes will be reviewed at the November General Meeting, and you will be asked to vote on them at the December General Meeting. Any questions or concerns should be addressed to infocharlottecca@gmail.com.

The following issues were identified and have been changed as follows:

Membership and Dues:

Members shall be those residents, non-residents, or businesses interested in the goals and purpose of the CCA, upon completion of a CCA membership application and payment of dues or sponsorship. The annual membership period shall be January 1st to December 31st. In the case of Sponsors, those also seeking advertising space and accommodation, the membership will be one twelve-month period commencing with the month of payment.

A member in good standing shall receive all communications and have voting privileges to cast one vote in person or by proxy at any Association meeting on any matter as to which membership are entitled to vote. In the case of joint memberships (Couples, Family/Supporter, or any designation decided upon by the Board of Directors) each person listed on the membership shall have one vote.

Any entity which chooses to become a sponsor, and pays the appropriate fee, will be considered a single member and be entitled to one vote as stipulated above for a member.

Board of Directors:

All members of the Board of Directors are required to reside within the boundaries of Charlotte except that, three members may reside outside of the boundaries of Charlotte, with the understanding that as members of the Board of Directors, they adhere to the principle of being interested in the goals of the CCA.

Finance:

Budget:

A proposed annual budget shall be prepared by the Treasurer, who shall consult with the Chairs of all committees of the Association. The Treasurer shall present the proposed budget to the Board of Directors for their review in November. The Board of Directors will adopt the budget and present it to the membership at the December general meeting. Committees shall stay within budget allocations of the fiscal year unless expenditures in excess of budget allocations are approved by the Board.

Checks:

The Treasurer and President shall have the authority to sign checks or can use charge via debit card, on behalf of the CCA.

Communication:

In the entire document, communication to members will be changed to read, "current most expedient means possible".

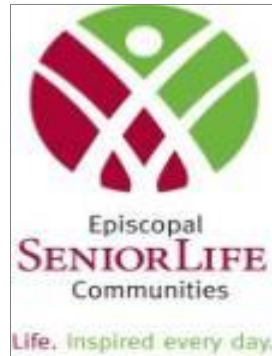

Recently, a United Nations report confirmed what we have long known to be true: that human activity is to blame for the alarming levels of carbon within our atmosphere, and that we are perilously close to the point of no return. Some have been asking about the status of the proposed new Neighborhood Service Center and Police Department Sub-Station at the intersection of State Route 104 and Lake Avenue. Heating Safety

Heating is the second leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries, and the third leading cause of home fire deaths. Local fire departments responded to an estimated average of 48,530 fires involving heating equipment per year in 2014-2018, accounting for 14% of all reported home fires during this time. These fires resulted in annual losses of 500 civilian deaths, 1,350 civilian injuries, and \$1.1 billion in direct property damage.

BE WARM AND SAFE THIS WINTER!

- Keep anything that can burn at least three-feet (one metre) away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot (one metre) "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month.



Equipment Smarts

Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Install and maintain CO alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning. If you **smell** gas in your gas heater, do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.

The Lighthouse will give 10% off most items, members receive an additional 10% for a total of 20% off. Not a member, you can join and get a total of 20% discount.

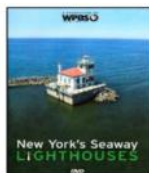

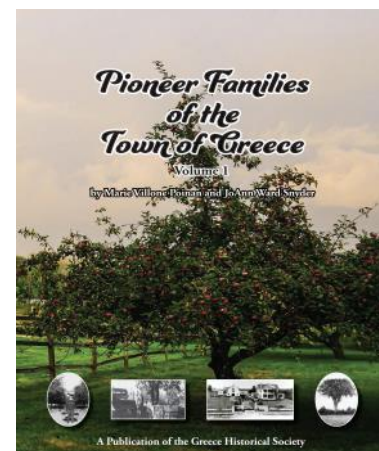

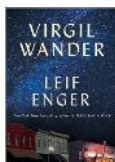

About our presenters: Maureen Whalen was a librarian with the Rochester Public Library for more than thirty years and the manager of the Charlotte Branch Library when she retired in 2007. Since her retirement she has been a volunteer at the Greece Historical Society. She has been a docent at the Seneca Park Zoo since 1996 and is their historian. In April 2020, she published her book A History of the Seneca Park Zoo. **Marie Poinan** volunteers at the Charlotte-Genesee Lighthouse and the Greece Historical Society.

She helped design the signage at the Bill Davis Overlook and served as editor of the "Discover the Harbor District" magazine/directory from 2000 through 2009. She has authored books on the history of Holy Cross Church, Charlotte High School and highlights of Charlotte history.

Charlotte Fall Leaf Collection November 15-19

It's that time of year again!

1. Leaves be raked into loose piles between the sidewalk and the curb before the Monday, November 15th.



Please note that it is unsafe and therefore illegal to place leaves directly onto streets or sidewalks.

2. Refuse collection: Residential and commercial refuse customers may always place bagged leaves at the curb for pickup on their regular refuse collection day.

3. Drop off: Residents may drop off loose leaves at the Materials Give Back site on Ferrano Street, near Colfax Street. Leaves are accepted Nov.-Dec., Monday - Saturday, 7 a.m. - 3 p.m. **NO BAGS ARE PERMITTED.** Residents can call 311 to report the address that needs leaf pickup and the City will do its best to service these situations after the city collection cycle has been completed.
