CCA Welcomes Its Newest Gold Sponsor: Charlotte Genesee Lighthouse As It Celebrates Its Bicentennial Year

n 1822 the United State Lighthouse Service turned on the Charlotte-Genesee Lighthouse lite (originally known as the Genesee Light Station # 2333 by the US Coast Guard). It is a 40 ft tower with a lantern room at the top, located near the



On February 28, 1881, the lighthouse was turned off, after nearby piers changed the mouth of the river, making the tower farther from the water. The light was then moved to a pier in 1884. The tower & lantern room were declared surplus in 1981 by the United States Government. It is now owned by Monroe County (celebrating its Bicentennial this year) and managed as a museum by the

States Coast Guard light

number 2333. It is automated to turn on at dusk and off at dawn.

This year is the **Bicentennial Celebration, 1822-2022**, where five major events are scheduled with four of them on the grounds of the Charlotte-Genesee Lighthouse. Come out and help us and help us celebrate!

The CCA is grateful to the Lighthouse for its expanded support of our endeavors.

experiences they might not be have been aware.

In its second year, *Project S.O.W.* (Seeds Of Wonder) a 4-H Food Gardening with Justice in Mind and a project for teens that introduces them to gardening, with additional foundations in justice and

leadership. Young people can expect to learn, lead, collaborate with others, and explore the power of their own voice and a sense of agency as a part of what it means to grow food as a skill for personal and for community empowerment.

This year the JROTC under the leadership of Sgt. Meister has almost 100 JROTC Cadets. Mr. Evan Lowenstein (4H educator) has been working with JROTC for the last two

months. Jonathan Hardin, the board Liaison from CCA to the Engagement Committee has chosen to work closely with JROTC at Leadership. Sgt. Meister states, this experience "has been awesome, everything is very successful!" This year, the JROCTC group completed * a color guard ceremony for a CCA meeting, a Bills, Jets and Celtics game, *completed 4

of 5 blood drives this year. Also planning: * working at the Cameron **Street Ministries** on Earth Day clean sweep of Lyell Ave., * Turning Point Park * St. John's Park * River Street Cemetery and * presenting the flag at the Lighthouse Bicentennial Celebration.

Last year, during a leadership engagement presentation with Barbara Lake and the students from Mr. Lane's P.I.G. class, students

identified three areas they would like to improve in their communities. One focus area was to have more nutritious affordable and available food. This year, the new middle school science teacher, Mr. Dedes, joined the group and expressed interest in engaging his class of 94 students with a winter sowing educational experience. *Home Depot* of Greece was enthusiastic to provide seeds, mini greenhouse starter kits and soil so youth could learn how to grow vegetables that they can later use in their own yards or containers to have fresh produce available in their neighborhoods to address their needs. The students made a Thank You card showing their interest in "learning by doing" which was presented to Sam, the manager on duty, Jonathan Hardin (CCA Board

member and Youth Engagement Liaison) Sam (Home Depot Manager), Barbara Lake (Youth Engagement Community Chair), and Vaughn Collins (LA site coordinator)

In May and June the students want to learn how to take what they grow and create fun, nutritional culinary masterpieces that they will create at the school. Food preservation, herb vinegars and healthy substitutions in meal

planning will be focused on dealing with teen health issues.

Work expanded in **Mr. Lane'**s P.I.G. class this year to include self-promotion tools such as students learning how to write a cover letter, scholarship applications, and creating a letter of intent when seeking employment. They furthered their knowledge

2022 Scholarship Announcement

t's that time of year again as college bound seniors start their search for financial aid.

This year the Charlotte
Community Association (CCA) is
pleased to announce that again,
two scholarships will be awarded
to college bound students who are
residents of the Charlotte
community or attend the
Leadership Academy for Young Men.

The **CCA** will award one \$2,000 award which is made possible through community fundraising and membership donations.

Another award of \$2,000 is provided by a fund created in



memory of **Edward Watson**, a Charlotte resident and former Charlotte High student.

The requirements for both scholarships are as follows: To qualify for the Edward Watson Scholarship the college bound senior must attend the Leadership Academy for Young Men (formerly Charlotte High School). To qualify for the CCA Scholarship the college bound senior must reside in the Charlotte neighborhood and attend

any school, public or private. All applications will be reviewed by the Scholarship Committee.

For many years the Charlotte Community Association has offered scholarships to students who qualify based on academics, community service and extracurricular activities. We are pleased to continue this tradition as well as help facilitate with the Edward Watson Scholarship.

A joint application will be available for both scholarships at the Charlotte Branch Library and online at the CCA website (charlottecca.org).

The Rochester Harborfest is returning to Ontario Beach Park in 2022. Presented by the Ontario Beach Park Program

Supporting the needs of working families has always been my top priority.

One of the most meaningful ways we can lower costs for families is by making the expanded *Child Tax Credit* permanent, which is why I sponsor the *American Families Act*. Originally enacted in the *American Rescue Plan*, the expanded *Child Tax Credit* had a profound effect on our community, lifting 8,200 children out of poverty. When payments began, households with children who reported they did not have enough to eat dropped 24%. Making these life-altering provisions permanent would support families, put more money back in their pockets, and strengthen our regional economy by allowing parents the flexibility to confidently return to work.

Another significant burden on families is the rising cost of prescription drugs. Over the past two decades, the price of insulin has skyrocketed to the point where millions of Americans can no longer afford the

medication they need to survive. The price of insulin for diabetic patients in our community is roughly 21 times more expensive than the identical medicine is in Australia, 14 times more than in the United Kingdom, and 12 times more than it is just across the border in Canada. I recently voted to cap the cost of insulin at just \$35, ensuring no one is forced to cut back or skip doses of insulin as a way of making ends meet.

As we continue to face challenging circumstances at home and abroad, it is more important than ever to take actions like this that ensure families have the essential support and resources they deserve.
