



Who was Abelard Reynolds?

- ✤ Was born on October 2, 1785 at a place called Quaker Hill, near Red Hook, NY.
- + In 1812, purchased lots (23 and 24) on the north side of what became East Main Street and built the first frame house west of the Genesee River.
- Moved his family to Rochester in 1813.
- + Was the first saddle-maker, the first magistrate, and the first inn-keeper on the "one-hundred acre tract."

+ Became the first Postmaster of the incorporated city of Rochester in 1812, appointed by Colonel Nathaniel Rochester.

Moved his house in 1828 to build the **Reynolds Arcade** on Main Street: a multi-storied brick + building 56 feet deep with 86 rooms and 14 cellars.

- ✤ Was one of the founders of Rochester's first public library.
- ✤ Was a member of the Masonic order and a Prelate of the Knights Templar.
- Was a member of the first Board of Education. +
- ✤ Died on December 19, 1878 in Rochester, NY.



My top priority in Congress has always been supporting families in our community—and this year, I was proud to help deliver on that promise in meaningful ways. From lowering the cost of prescription drugs to protecting women's healthcare and enacting common-sense gun reform, my colleagues and I took action on some of the biggest issues facing families today.


Earlier this year, the Supreme Court ruled to overturn the constitutional right to abortion established in *Roe v. Wade* in 1973. I believe intimate healthcare decisions should be made between a woman and her doctor, not the government—which is why I voted to pass the *Women's Health Protection Act*. This legislation would codify the provisions of *Roe v. Wade* and ensure access to reproductive healthcare is federally protected, no matter what. This bill has stalled in the Senate, but Iwill continueto get this legislation signed into law.

One of the issues hitting families the hardest is the everincreasing price of prescription drugs, which is particularly challenging for seniors who rely on a fixed income. No one should be forced to ration their medication or forgo filling prescriptions just to make ends meet. This year, we took concrete steps to bring down costs for seniors by allowing Medicare to negotiate drug prices, establishing an annual outof-pocket cap on annual drug costs, and lowering the cost of insulin—one of the most common and life-sustaining medications—to just \$35 per month. These changes have been signed into law and will be transformative for thousands of families in our community.

In our community and across the country, too many innocent lives have been lost to senseless gun violence. We are not powerless against these tragedies—we can, and we must, pass common-sense gun reforms that will keep families safe. This year we took an important step forward by passing the *Bipartisan Safer* Communities Act, which marked the most significant gun control legislation in over two decades. The package strengthened red-flag laws, enhanced background checks, and bolstered community-based violence prevention programs—but it is still far from enough. I remain committed to fighting for additional reforms: banning assault weapons and high-capacity magazines, enacting universal background checks, and cracking down on gun trafficking to get illegal weapons off our streets.



The Rochester Police Department's Citizen's Police Academy (C.P.A.) is a 10-session program held once a year with an average of 20-25 attendees. This year we are encouraging community members and business owners to apply for the 29th Academy. Classes will run for 10 weeks on Wednesday nights from 6 pm to 9 pm, starting on January 25, 2023 and concluding on March 29, 2023.







The C.P.A. program was established by the Rochester Police Department in 1992 with the objective to advance our collaborative partnerships between our department and the community we "Serve with Pride" to develop solutions to problems and increase public trust.







The C.P.A. program provides a broad based look at the policies, procedures and operations of the Rochester Police Department. At its conclusion, attendees will be more familiar with law enforcement in their city neighborhoods and also with the training currently being provided to police officers. Attendees will have opportunities to offer comments and suggestions on police procedures and the recruit academy curriculum.

Classes will be held at the Public Safety Training Facility located at 1190 Scottsville Road, Rochester, NY 14624.




